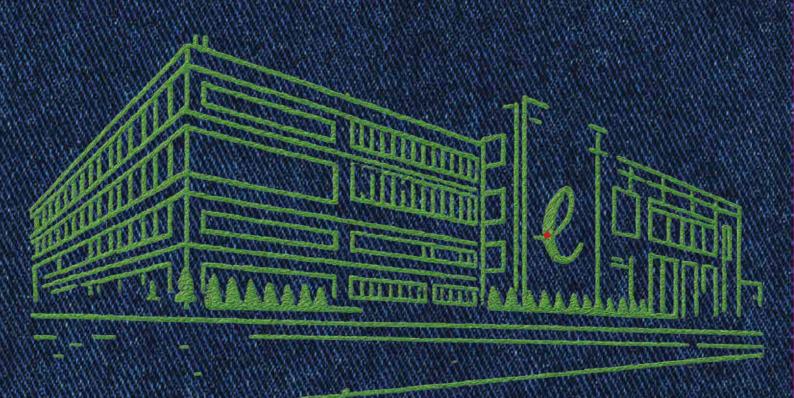

- (i) Shareholders whose names appeared in the Depository Register as of the Record Date, which was **26 October 2025**, are eligible to participate in the 30th Annual General Meeting (AGM) and are entitled to receive the dividend.
- (ii) Though the company is permitted to hold the AGM in digital form as per the BSEC circular, considering the importance of shareholders' active participation, the AGM will be conducted through a hybrid system. Members will have the option to participate and vote either in person or by proxy at the specified location or virtually via a digital platform.
- (iii) The shareholders, who will join virtually, are requested to participate in the meeting by logging into this link or by scanning the QR code below:

To log in to the system, members need to enter their 16-digit Beneficial Owner (BO) ID number as proof of identity. An OTP will be sent during the login process to the member's mobile number, as recorded in the central depository system. Otherwise, members can update their valid mobile number with us by submitting a written request at least 12 hours before the meeting begins.

- (iv) The members will be able to submit their questions/comments and vote electronically 48 hours before the commencement of the AGM and during the AGM. The members may also submit their questions/comments and Vote in person or by proxy during the AGM.
- (v) Shareholders are requested to present credentials as proof of their shareholdings during registration at the meeting venue.
- (vi) The proxy form, to be affixed with requisite revenue stamp or notarized Power of Attorney or Authorization Letter, duly executed, must be deposited at the Registered Office of the Company not less than 48 hours before the time fixed for the meeting.

STATEMENT OF THE BUSINESS TO BE TRANSACTED AT THE MEETING

[The following Explanatory Statement sets out material facts relating to the businesses to be transacted at the 30th Annual General Meeting of Envoy Textiles Limited scheduled for 6 December 2025]

Agenda Item No. 1: To receive, consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2025 together with the Reports of the Director's and the Auditors' thereon

The Annual Report for 2025 includes the Annual Accounts for the period ending on 30 June 2025, along with the Reports of the Auditors and the report from the Board of Directors.

The Annual Accounts for the financial year 2024-2025 have been prepared and approved by the members of the Board, as well as reviewed by the CEO and CFO of the Company before submission to the Audit Committee. M/S K.M. Hasan & Co., Chartered Accountants, the external auditors of the Company, have issued an unqualified audit opinion with an emphasis on a particular matter, which has been included in the Annual Accounts for the financial year 2024-2025.

As per sections 183 and 184 of the Companies Act, 1994, the directors are required to present the Director's Report and Annual Audited Financial Statements, including the Auditors' Report, to the Shareholders at the Annual General Meeting.

It is proposed to adopt the Annual Accounts for the financial year 2024-2025, along with the Reports of the Director's and the Auditors'.

Agenda Item No. 2: To declare dividend for the year ended 30 June 2025

The net income attributable to Shareholders amounted to Taka 1,408.90 million, resulting in an Earnings per Share (EPS) of Taka 8.40 for the Financial Year 2024-2025. In its 246th meeting held on 25 September 2025, the Board of Directors recommended a 30% Cash Dividend, which equals Tk. 3.00 for every share of Tk. 10.00 each, for the year ending on 30 June 2025. This recommendation will be presented to the 30th Annual General Meeting of Shareholders scheduled for 6 December 2025. If approved at the General

Meeting, the payment of the final dividend for the year ended on 30 June 2025, as recommended by the Board, will be made on or before 5 January 2026, following the Annual General Meeting, in accordance with the notification by the Bangladesh Securities & Exchange Commission (BSEC). The dividend will be payable to those members whose names appear in the statement of beneficial owners furnished by Central Depository Bangladesh Limited (CDBL) as of the Record Date on 26 October 2025.

Members are requested to submit their written option to receive the dividend to the Company's Registered/Corporate Office on or before the date of 30th AGM. Failure to submit such an option within the specified time will result in the dividend being paid as deemed appropriate by the Company.

Agenda Item No. 3: To elect the following Directors in accordance with the provision of Articles of Association of the Company as recommended by the Board:

- 3.1 Mrs. Sumayyah Ahmed
- 3.2 Mr. Sunil Daulatram Daryanani
- 3.3 Mr. Md. Moin Uddin

In accordance with Article No. 125 and 126 of the Articles of Association of Envoy Textiles Limited, Director Mrs. Sumayyah Ahmed; Director Mr. Sunil Daulatram Daryanani, and Director Mr. Md. Moin Uddin are set to retire from their positions as directors. However, as they are eligible, they have offered themselves for re-election.

Based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the members of the Board, in their 246th meeting held on 25 September 2025, proposed to re-elect Director Mrs. Sumayyah Ahmed; Director Mr. Sunil Daulatram Daryanani, and Director Mr. Md. Moin Uddin as members of the Company's Board for a period until their retirement by rotation, as stipulated by section 91 of the Companies Act, 1994, and the relevant provisions of the Articles of Association.

Their reappointment is subject to approval by the general shareholders at the 30th Annual General Meeting (AGM).



Agenda Item No. 4: To confirm the appointment of a female Independent Director

The Board of Directors, at its 246th meeting on 25 September 2025, appointed Professor Tanzina Haque, FCMA, as an Independent Director for a three-year term.

In line with the company's commitment to upholding the highest standards of corporate governance and bringing diverse expertise to the Board, the Nomination and Remuneration Committee (NRC), at its 28th meeting held on 9 August 2025, conducted a thorough review of Professor Haque's credentials. Following this detailed assessment, the NRC unanimously recommended her appointment.

To ensure full regulatory compliance, an application seeking the necessary approval for this appointment, along with all supporting documents, was submitted to the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission (BSEC). We are pleased to report that the BSEC has granted its formal consent for this appointment.

Professor Haque is a distinguished academic and a seasoned professional. She is a Professor at the University of Dhaka with over 21 years of teaching experience in the Department of Accounting and Information Systems. Her academic qualifications include a Master of Business Administration from the University of Dhaka and a Master of International Business from the University of Melbourne, Australia. Furthermore, she is a Fellow Cost and Management Accountant (FCMA), a testament to her professional excellence.

The Board has confirmed that Professor Haque meets all the stipulated requirements for an Independent Director under the BSEC Code and has fulfilled all necessary compliance obligations.

In accordance with the BSEC notification and relevant laws, this appointment is now presented to the esteemed shareholders for their valuable confirmation at the upcoming 30th Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Agenda Item No. 5: To appoint Auditors of the Company for the term until the conclusion of 31st Annual General Meeting and to fix up their remuneration

M/S K.M. Hasan & Co., Chartered Accountants has carried out the Audit of Accounts of the Company for the year 2024-2025 and completed 3rd year of

audit. They are not eligible for re-appointment, in accordance with the provision of BSEC Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006- 158/208/Admin/ 81 dated 20 June 2018 and Regulation No. 15(3) of Stock Exchange (Listing) Regulations, 2015

Among the proposal received from the Chartered Accountants firms, in recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Board of the Directors at its 246th meeting held on 25 September 2025 proposed for the appointment of M/S MABS & J Partners, Chartered Accountants at a remuneration to be fixed at AGM to hold office for the period until conclusion of the next (31st) Annual General Meeting of the Company for auditing the accounts for the year ended 30 June 2026

Please also be informed that M/S MABS & J Partners, Chartered Accountants is in the panel Auditors by BSEC.

It is proposed to appoint M/S MABS & J Partners, Chartered Accountants, in compliance with the section 210 of the Companies Act, 1994 & BSEC Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006- 158/208/Admin/81 dated 20 June 2018, as the external auditor of the Company charged with the auditing of the Annual Accounts for the financial year 2025-2026 at a recommended fee of Taka 450,000.00 (Taka Four Hundred Fifty Thousand) only, which is to be fixed at the 30th AGM.

Agenda Item No. 6: To appoint a Professional Accountant/Secretary for the year 2025-26

It is necessary to appoint a practicing Professional Accountant/Secretary for the year 2025-26 to conduct a compliance audit on the corporate governance code set by the Bangladesh Securities & Exchange Commission (BSEC), in accordance with the provision of 9(1) of the BSEC Notification issued on 3 June 2018, Ref. No. # BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80. The purpose of this appointment is to obtain a certificate confirming compliance with the conditions outlined in the Corporate Governance Code 2018 of the Commission.

ABOUT THE COMPANY

DENIM FABRIC PRODUCTION UNIT

Envoy Textiles Limited, a manufacturer of 100% export-oriented denim fabric, was established in 1995 as a Private Limited Company before being converted to a Public Limited Company in 2009. It is the first denim project in Bangladesh to use rope-dyed technology and is now one of the leading companies in the sector.

The company began commercial operations in 2008 and merged with Edge Denims Limited in 2009, paving the way for a new era of excellence in management, cost control, and streamlined business operations. In June 2012, Envoy Textiles Limited obtained consent from the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission to raise funds through Initial Public Offerings (IPO) and was listed with DSE and CSE at the end of the same year.

Located in Jamirdia, Bhaluka, Mymensingh, around 71 km north of Dhaka City, the factory occupies approximately 126 Bigha of land registered in the name of the company. The layout plan is designed to create a scenic and eye-catching landscape all around.

SPINNING PLANT (COTTON YARN PRODUCTION UNIT)

Envoy Textiles has implemented backward integration in its denim production process by establishing its own spinning unit within the factory compound. Spanning an area of 320,000 sq. ft., the spinning unit operates with state-of-the-art technology, producing approximately 70-71 MT of yarn per day. Its annual production capacity is set at 25,000 MT.

The primary focus of the spinning unit is to supply yarn for the company's in-house denim fabric production. To ensure the production of high-quality denim fabric, the unit utilizes European machinery known for its excellence.

Commercial operations of the spinning unit commenced at the end of 2016, marking a significant milestone in Envoy Textiles' pursuit of vertical integration and maintaining control over the entire denim manufacturing process.

BLENDED YARN PRODUCTION UNIT

The company has recently established a blended yarn project, which involves producing yarn using a significant proportion of cotton substitute raw

materials. In recent decades, there has been a rise in the share of man-made fibers compared to natural fibers.

It is anticipated that the demand for blended yarn will surpass that of cotton yarn in the near future. Blended yarn combines the advantages of polyester with the strengths of cotton fabrics. It not only inherits the desirable qualities of polyester but also retains the beneficial properties of cotton.

The project commenced commercial operation on 1 April 2023, with a capacity of 4,200 MT yarn production per year. The project is equipped with state-of-the-art European and Japanese machinery, and the production facility occupies a floor space of 75,000 square feet within the existing factory premises. Around 60 to 70% of the production will be used internally for denim production, while the remaining portion will be allocated for the deemed export market.

This project is notable for its unique production facilities as it will manufacture various types of special blended yarns for the first time in the industry.

PRODUCTS

Envoy Textiles Limited is a leading denim manufacturing company with a yearly production capacity of 52.00 million yards. The company produces a range of high-quality denim products featuring a wide range of yarns and weaves in various shades of indigo and black. The company specializes in 4.5 oz to 14.75 oz ring and open-end denim and uses stretch, mill wash, and modern finishing processes for products intended for the new-age consumers. These products feature ring-ring constructions in pure indigo and sanforized denim. Envoy Textiles specializes in basic indigo products and plans to move up the value chain to cater to the most refined customers.

Research and Development occupy high importance in the company for product innovation, variations, and color combinations for consumers with exclusive taste. This has contributed to seizing new opportunities, newer markets, and fashionable customers across the globe on an increasing note.

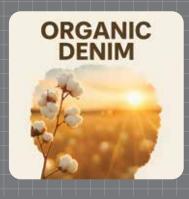

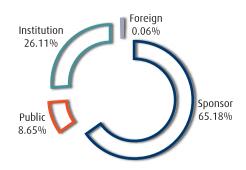

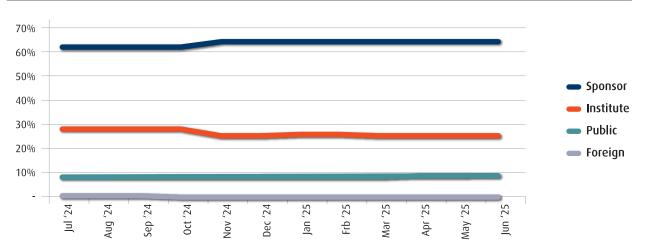

"We are a global sustainability leader, recognized as the world's first LEED Platinum denim mill, and are powered by renewable energy, advanced water recycling, and waste-to-energy systems. Our product strategy focuses on innovative, value-added denim from sustainable materials, supported by a global network of design centers. Our deep commitment to social responsibility is reflected in impactful healthcare, environmental, and community initiatives. We are committed to continuous investment in digitalization, skilled workforce development, and market expansion to ensure long-term growth and solidify our competitive advantage for our shareholders."

The textile industry of Bangladesh, particularly the denim manufacturing sector, is currently navigating a dynamic phase of the Fourth Industrial Revolution. Our company, Envoy Textiles, has embraced this transformation as a strategic opportunity and is playing a pioneering role in technological innovation.

Sustainability is another core tenet of our company's strategy. Eco-friendly technology, such as laser finishing, enables us to provide cost-effective solutions while dramatically reducing the use of water and chemicals in ozone washing. Through E-Flow/Smart Foam technology, we ensure high-quality finishing with minimal water. Besides, our Eco-Performance Lab assesses the environmental impact of the entire production process, significantly simplifying the carbon traceability and ESG reporting required for global markets, including the EU.

These cutting-edge technologies are not only reducing our operational costs but are also helping us become a central figure in transforming Bangladesh's textile industry into a more sustainable, competitive, and future-forward sector. We firmly believe that our investment in innovation and sustainability will ensure long-term and sustainable profitability for our shareholders and establish our company as a leading partner in the global textiles supply chain.

An eco-friendly operational environment is not just a part of our social responsibility; it has become a key driver for business growth. We have already commissioned a 2.2 MW (peak) solar plant and have plans to expand it to approximately 7 MW by 2026. This initiative is reducing our grid electricity costs, stabilizing our production, and increasing our acceptability among global buyers.

Also, we have a biogas plant where we convert production waste and food scraps into energy. This reduces our fuel costs and simplifies waste management. Concurrently, our Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP) and Water Treatment Plant (WTP) ensure water recycling and reuse. A portion of the treated water from the ETP is purified to meet WHO standards for drinking water. This process saves approximately 2.1 billion liters of fresh water annually. Our goal is to reduce groundwater usage by 90% by 2027. This not only lowers water costs but is also instrumental in gaining the trust of global brands.



We utilize almost all pre- and post-production waste. 'Pre' refers to waste from cotton and yarn, while 'post' refers to waste obtained from fabric scraps and used clothing. Also, we purchase and use waste fabric from other factories. Our waste volume is kept near zero, which has been highly praised by our international clients.

Complementing this is our jacket heat recovery system, which captures waste heat from engine cooling jackets and converts it into hot water. This water is used for pre-heating, steam generation, and space heating. As a result, energy efficiency is increased, operational costs are reduced, and carbon emissions are lowered.

Another major goal is the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. Our emissions stood at 83 thousand tons in 2024, but we aim to reduce this by 56% by 2030 and have a plan to achieve net-zero emissions by 2040. This aligns us with the sustainable supply chain requirements of global brands.

We are also advancing towards sustainability in raw material usage. Our target is to use 100% sustainable raw materials by 2030. Our current raw material composition includes BCI (38%), Conventional Cotton (33%), Organic (18%), Recycled (7%), and CmiA (4%). This 67% sustainable cotton not only protects the environment but is also securing our position in the premium market.

We ensure 100% safety in chemical usage. All chemicals we use are internationally certified and safe for product quality, worker health, and the environment. On top of it, all effluent wastewater is treated, with 68% of it being recycled or reused. The caustic soda used in the process is recovered and made reusable through a recovery plant.

We have fundamentally evolved beyond our role as a premier denim fabric manufacturer. Today, we are innovators at the forefront of sustainable textiles, driven by a core commitment to research and development. A key pillar of our strategy is the integration of locally sourced, natural fibers into our production process.

We are proud to be the first in Bangladesh to commercially develop denim from a jute-cotton yarn blend, a response to the growing global demand for cotton alternatives. Simultaneously,

we have successfully created denim using banana tree fiber, sourced from our local communities.

These breakthroughs are more than just commercial successes; they are a testament to our social commitment to environmental stewardship and our dedication to strengthening the local ecosystem.

These initiatives have earned Envoy Textiles numerous national and international recognitions, with 41 prestigious awards in our portfolio. Buyers now prioritize environmentally friendly suppliers. Consequently, these measures are directly contributing to securing new orders, building long-term partnerships, and ensuring the sustained growth of our business.

We regularly participate in various international fairs and mill weeks, where our products are presented directly to numerous foreign brands. This significantly accelerates the expansion of our business.

Our commitment to meeting various international standards was recognized when we were awarded the LEED Platinum certification by the U.S. Green Building Council twice between 2016-2021. We first achieved this honor with a score of 80 and subsequently with a perfect score of 100.

To ensure the quality of our processes and products, we engage foreign consultants and specialist professionals, including our CEO, Marketing Director, and senior R&D officials.

Envoy Textiles is strengthening its position in the foreign market and international competition primarily through sustainable development, quality, and market expansion strategies.

We are the world's first LEED Platinum certified denim mill, utilizing solar energy, biogas, water treatment, waste recycling, Ecolab technology, and heat recovery systems. These initiatives have made our sustainable production more acceptable to international brands.

We are also working on diversifying our product range, as mentioned before. We produce value-added denim using various sustainable raw materials, including organic, recycled, and BCI cotton, which is securing our access to the premium market.



To further strengthen our global presence, we have established design and development centers in Dhaka and New York, in addition to operating an office in Hong Kong. This allows us to receive direct feedback from customers and respond quickly to market demands.

Our plans include developing a digital supply chain model, entering new markets, and developing more value-added products. Through these initiatives, our position in international competition will be further strengthened.

Our CSR activities are generating long-term positive impacts in the areas of education, health, and the environment. Initiatives such as establishing and maintaining the country's first Pediatric ICU/HDU (Burn Unit) at Dhaka Medical College and providing financial assistance to patients with rare diseases have already brought about significant change in our society.

As part of the Envoy Textiles family, 18 physically challenged individuals work with us on a regular basis. Besides, we organize internship programs and study tours for both local and international students. Simultaneously, safe water booths for workers and local communities, biogas distribution, and our aquaponics research project have further solidified our commitment to sustainable development.

In times of disaster, we have always stood by the community—from aiding victims of the Rana Plaza and Tazreen Fashions tragedies to participating in relief efforts for those affected by landslides and floods. These efforts have not only provided immediate assistance but have also built long-term trust and confidence. We will always strive to be there for the nation in any crisis.

Looking forward, we plan to expand these activities through digital education, modern healthcare services, special initiatives for women, and the promotion of sustainable agriculture and renewable energy. Our goal is to integrate social welfare with business growth to create lasting positive changes for future generations.

We are continuously working to strengthen digitalization and Artificial Intelligence (AI) across our processes. We believe that the greatest demand of the current era is the rapid exchange of information. To this end, we are persistently striving to enhance our Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system. Also, necessary measures are being taken to develop a skilled workforce through comprehensive Human Resource training.

We deeply value your continued support and sincerely thank you for your patience as we work towards our company's success.

It is my great pleasure to welcome you all to the 30th Annual General Meeting of Envoy Textiles Limited.

We remain dedicated to being transparent and accountable, and we are committed to these values for the future. I am anticipating a productive and successful meeting with all of you.

Executive Summary:

FY 2024-25 was a period of outstanding financial performance for Envoy Textiles, fueled by heightened global demand, our robust market positioning, and strategic product diversification. We are optimistic that our recent initiatives—including the relocation of our domestic marketing office to Gulshan and the establishment of our new liaison office in New York—will further strengthen our international presence and deepen client relationships in the near future.

Our commitment to innovation is evident in operational upgrades such as our ongoing pilot for a groundbreaking indigo dye recovery system. Financially, we have fortified our foundation through a strategic \$30 million sustainability-linked loan from the Asian Development Bank (ADB). This funding will directly support the expansion of our Blended Yarn Project and, just as importantly, allows us to refinance higher-cost local debt, generating substantial savings that will enhance our profitability.

Underpinning all our efforts is a deep-rooted dedication to sustainable and responsible manufacturing. This is demonstrated through our fully operational waste fabric recycling plant, the successful commissioning and planned expansion of our solar energy facility, and meaningful community and employee programs such as our in-house biogas plant and fair-price shop. Together, these actions solidify our competitive edge and pave the way for continued, sustainable growth.



Financial Performance

It is with immense pride and optimism that we present the financial results for the fiscal year 2024-25. This year has been one of exceptional performances, marked by record-breaking growth across all key financial metrics. Our company has not only demonstrated remarkable resilience but has also successfully capitalized on global opportunities, translating into significant value creation for you, our stakeholders.

FY 2024-25 was a landmark year, characterized by robust, double-digit growth that accelerated through each quarter. This was not a fleeting

success but a sustained demonstration of our strategic execution.

- Revenue: Surged to BDT 18,624.80 million, growing consistently from BDT 14,261.38 million in the previous year.
- Gross Profit: Increased by 52.67%, showcasing a dramatic improvement in our operational efficiency and pricing power.
- Net Profit: Increased spectacularly, underscoring our ability to convert top-line growth into bottom-line results through effective cost management and strategic leverage.

Our Marketing Initiatives

To further strengthen our global presence, we have established design and development centers in Dhaka and New York, in addition to operating an office in Hong Kong. This allows us to receive direct feedback from customers and respond quickly to market demands.

Our plans include developing a digital supply chain model, entering new markets, and developing more value-added products. Through these initiatives, our position in international competition will be further strengthened.

Our facility is equipped with cutting-edge ring spinning technology, utilizing advanced machinery from leading European and Japanese manufacturers.

Approximately 60-70% of our production supports our denim manufacturing operations, while the remaining yarn is allocated for export markets. This strategic distribution allows us to meet both internal requirements and external market

demand, positioning the Blended Yarn Project as a key contributor to our sustainability and growth objectives.

Gulshan Marketing Office

We are pleased to inform you of the successful completion of a key strategic initiative- the relocation of our marketing office to the Gulshan area in April 2025. This move is a direct response to long-standing market feedback and is designed to significantly enhance our customer engagement and operational effectiveness.

Our previous location in Panthapath, while

serviceable, presented growing challenges to our customer-centric model. A significant majority of our key clients, including major buyers and



international delegates, are concentrated in the core business and diplomatic zones of Gulshan, Banani, and Baridhara.

The previous location's distance resulted in excessive travel time for these buyers, which had become a notable barrier to frequent and productive visits.



By being closer to our buyers, we remove a significant logistical hurdle. This convenience is expected to foster stronger relationships, encourage more frequent visits, and deepen customer engagement, directly impacting sales opportunities.

Our sales and marketing teams will benefit from drastically reduced transit times to client meetings. The new location offers superior convenience for our international buyers, with easier access from the airport and proximity to the reputed hotels where they typically reside.

The former marketing office on the 6th floor of Envoy Tower has been rented out. The revenue generated from this lease is being strategically allocated to offset the costs associated with the relocation, ensuring a minimal net impact on our operational expenses.

This relocation is more than a change of address; it is a tangible investment in our customer relationships and market presence. It underscores our commitment to listening to our buyers and adapting our operations to better serve their needs. We are confident that this move will yield positive returns through increased customer satisfaction, improved sales team productivity, and strengthened brand positioning.

New York Office

As part of our ongoing commitment to strategic global expansion and long-term growth, we are pleased to announce a significant milestone for our Company - the successful establishment of a liaison office in New York, USA, which became operational in January 2025.

This decisive move is designed to directly capitalize on the substantial and dynamic opportunities within the American market. By placing a physical presence in the heart of Manhattan's renowned Textile District, we are positioning ourselves at the epicenter of the North American fashion and apparel industry. This district is home to a high concentration of buyers' offices and industry leaders, making it the ideal location to amplify our market reach.

The office significantly improves our accessibility to key U.S. based buyers, facilitating stronger, more personal relationships with existing clients and providing a permanent base for engagement.

A physical address in this prime business location

substantially strengthens our brand's prestige and reputation, signaling our serious commitment to the U.S. market and fostering greater trust with current and potential buyers.

It will underscore our proactive approach to capturing market share and building a more resilient, globally integrated enterprise. We are confident that this initiative will be a key driver of value creation for our company and our shareholders in the years to come.

Waste Fabric Recycle Plant

We are pleased to announce that the company has successfully commenced full-scale commercial operations at its state-of-the-art Waste Fabric Recycling Plant.

As previously communicated, this strategic initiative is a cornerstone of our commitment to sustainable and circular manufacturing. The plant, established at our existing factory premises, is now fully functional and is operating at its designed capacity of processing 12 metric tons (MT) of waste fabrics per day.

The plant processes both locally sourced and in-house generated pre-industrial and post-consumer waste fabrics (including garment cuttings and denim), converting them into high-quality recycled fiber certified under Global

Recycled Standard (GRS) and Recycled Claim Standard (RCS). This certified fiber is directly reintroduced into our yarn production cycle, creating a closed-loop system.



The Board of Directors believes this project will substantially contribute to the company's long-term value creation by solidifying our competitive advantage in the global market for sustainable textiles.

Slasher Dying

We are pleased to announce a new project to significantly expand the dyeing capacity within our denim production process. This expansion will be achieved through the installation of state-of-the-art slasher dyeing technology with nitrogen integration, an advanced and highly efficient system.



This project is a key pillar of our strategy to diversify our product portfolio and capture a larger share of the global denim market. While our existing, industry-leading rope-dyeing technology—the first of its kind in Bangladesh—will continue to serve the medium-end market segment with premium fabrics, this new slasher dyeing line will allow us to produce a new range of high-quality, yet more economical, fabrics.

This strategic move is aimed at effectively competing in the large and growing value segment of the market, creating a new revenue stream and enhancing our overall competitiveness.

Solar Energy Plant

We have successfully commissioned a 2.2 MW solar power plant, primarily financed through the Bangladesh Bank's Refinancing Scheme for Green Projects. The plant is currently operating at 80% efficiency, generating clean energy for an average of 4.5 to 5 hours daily.

Building on this success, we plan to expand our

solar capacity by an additional 3.5 MWp. This expansion will significantly boost our in-house power generation, reduce our reliance on the national grid, and



enhance our energy security.

This initiative underscores our commitment to environmental leadership and financial prudence. It not only reduces our carbon footprint and ensures compliance with international buyer standards but also delivers long-term cost savings.

Indigo Dye Recovery Pilot Project

We are pleased to announce a groundbreaking strategic initiative that underscores our commitment to operational innovation, environmental sustainability, and cost leadership. The Company has entered into an agreement to implement a pilot plant for an Indigo Dye Recovery System within our production premises.

This project, the first of its kind in Bangladesh, aims to revolutionize the denim dyeing process by capturing and recycling valuable indigo dye that was previously lost as waste. This initiative aligns

directly with our core goals of reducing environmental impact, decreasing raw material consumption, and enhancing long-term profitability.

Cactus Antimicrobials, Inc. (Cactus), a subsidiary of Cactus Materials Inc., registered in Arizona, USA, is a technology leader in proprietary antimicrobial nanotechnology with applications in water and effluent treatment, who has invested in and will install the pilot plant using its advanced technology.

Greenlab Environmental Consultants Limited (Greenlab) is acting as the local integrator. Greenlab will facilitate the installation, provide on-ground coordination, and ensure ongoing maintenance and technical support throughout the pilot phase.

Upon successful completion, the project is designed to directly recover and reuse a high-value raw material (indigo dye), thereby reducing procurement costs and waste disposal expenses.

It will also drastically reduce the chemical load in our effluent, minimizing our environmental footprint and supporting our corporate social responsibility (CSR) objectives.

We will keep you updated on the progress and results of this exciting initiative.

Governance

At our core, we recognize the importance of sound governance practices and uphold our commitment to adhere to the highest standards of corporate governance. Accountability, transparency, and ethical conduct are central to all our business activities, ensuring that we conduct ourselves with the utmost integrity. ADB sustainability-linked loan facility

We are pleased to announce a landmark achievement for our company: the successful execution of a \$30 million, sustainability-linked loan facility with the Asian Development Bank (ADB). This seven-year financing arrangement marks a significant milestone, not only for us but for the entire country, as it represents ADB's first sustainability-linked loan in Bangladesh.

This strategic partnership is a powerful testament to our commitment to sustainable growth and operational excellence. The proceeds from this facility will be strategically channeled into three key areas that will shape our future: first, to finance an expansion of our yarn production by 4,550 MT per year, capturing new market opportunities; second, to fund the installation of 3.5 MWp of rooftop solar modules, advancing our energy independence; and third, to refinance existing local working capital loans.

It is through this third objective that we will realize immediate and substantial financial benefits. By replacing existing, higher-cost debt with this long-term, favorable financing, the company is positioned to save a substantial amount in financial expenses each year. This direct improvement to our bottom line, combined with the growth and efficiency driven by our expansion and solar projects, creates a powerful combination for enhancing profitability.

Structured with an 18-month grace period, followed by 12 equal semi-annual installments, this loan provides us with the flexible, patient capital required to execute our plans effectively. Ultimately, this partnership with the ADB is more than just capital; it is a strategic enabler that will advance environmental sustainability, support our industrial modernization, and deliver greater value to our shareholders.

Research & Development

Our Research & Development team is dedicated to pursuing continuous innovation while promoting sustainable and environmentally-conscious production processes. By reducing waste and implementing sustainable practices throughout our supply chain, we are committed to achieving our company's green goals.

To accomplish this, we work closely with our supply chain partners to promote sustainability concepts and develop new strategies for reducing the consumption of dyes, chemicals, water, steam, and other resources used in fabric manufacturing. Our goal is to produce environmentally-friendly fabrics that are in high demand globally, with functional values that offer a complete solution to our customers' needs.

In recognition of the importance of innovation to sustain our growth, we have established an Innovation Center, equipped with state-of-the-art equipment and staffed by a team of international experts who are dedicated to developing cutting-edge products that meet the evolving demands of the market. Our commitment to sustainable innovation ensures that we continue to offer our customers the best possible solutions while minimizing our impact on the environment.

Commitment for Green Environment

At Envoy Textiles, we are deeply committed to creating a green environment and providing a workplace that supports recreational activities for our employees. Our dedication to quality has earned us several prestigious certifications, bringing rare honor to our country.

We are proud to have achieved LEED Platinum certification from the US Green Building Council, a remarkable accomplishment for any textile manufacturer in Bangladesh and denim manufacturer in the world. This platinum score is considered the highest standard of prestige, and it is a testament to our success in ensuring maximum environmental safety in our workplace.

Our commitment to sustainability is reflected in all aspects of our work, as we strive to create a work process that is both eco-friendly and sustainable in the long term. We believe that this approach not only benefits our employees and stakeholders, but also contributes to the larger goal of protecting our planet's resources for future generations.

Biogas Plant

We are pleased to announce that Envoy Textiles Limited has launched a 30m³/day capacity biogas plant. This facility converts organic waste from the canteen, domestic sources, and cattle cow dung into clean, renewable energy.



As part of this waste-to-wealth initiative, the resulting biofertilizer is processed with dryer technology to optimize its nutrient content. It is used for gardening on the company's premises and is also distributed externally to enrich neighboring farmland.

The project eliminates open landfilling, reduces greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, and provides biogas free of charge to 25



nearby households, underscoring the company's commitment to corporate social responsibility (CSR). Aligned with Envoy's sustainability strategy and certifications like LEED and ISO 14001, this project exemplifies how waste circularity, renewable energy, and GHG reduction can collectively address pressing environmental challenges.

Establishment of a Fair-Price Shop

As part of our ongoing commitment to employee well-being and sustainable workplace development, Envoy Textiles Limited has introduced a Fair-Price Shop within the factory premises. This initiative aims to support our valued workforce (Band 01 to Band 06) by providing daily essentials—such as rice, lentils, oil, and sugar—at reasonable prices, along with the convenience of

credit-based purchases.

This report outlines our multi-faceted CSR initiatives, which are strategically designed to create a positive impact on our employees, the local community, and the nation at large. Our efforts are structured around four key pillars: Community Healthcare & Welfare, Employee Wellbeing, Environmental Conservation, and Public Awareness & Education.

A. COMMUNITY HEALTHCARE & WELFARE

1. State-of-the-Art Pediatric HDU at DMCH Burn Unit

Envoy Textiles has constructed and fully maintains a state-of-the-art Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and High Dependency Unit (HDU) at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital Burn Unit. As the first dedicated facility of its kind for pediatric burn patients in Bangladesh, this initiative fills a critical healthcare gap. Our ongoing commitment includes covering all maintenance costs, from comprehensive cleaning and laundry services to the upkeep of all electrical, mechanical, and civil infrastructure.

2. Support for Deceased Victims of Industrial Disasters

Demonstrating industry-wide solidarity, Envoy Textiles provides continuous financial support to the families of five deceased victims of the Tajreen Fashions fire incident. Although not directly linked, the company disburses the equivalent of their last drawn salaries to the nominees through the Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA).

3. Targeted Financial Aid for Critical Needs

We provide direct financial assistance in cases of extreme hardship. Notable interventions include:

a. Tree Man Disease: Provided a special monthly allowance for one year to Mr. Bajandar, a patient with the rare Epidermodysplasia Verruciformis, to support his living expenses during treatment.

- **b.Rana Plaza Accident:** Contributed financial aid to victims through BGMEA.
- **c. Natural Disaster Relief:** Donated to the Prothom Alo Trust to support victims of hill landslides in Rangamati, Chittagong, and Khaqrachari.

4. Community Infrastructure & Safety

- **a. Community Police Box:** Established a Police Box at our main gate to enhance security, improve traffic management on the highway, and ensure rapid emergency response for both the company and the community.
- **b. Safe Drinking Water Access:** Maintains a WHO and Bangladesh Department of Public Health-certified water booth, providing free, safe drinking water to employees and local residents.
- **c. Community Mosque:** Built and opened the Dubalia-Para Jame Masjid in August 2022, a modern mosque serving 260 worshippers and offering free Quranic education.

B. EMPLOYEE WELLBEING & INCLUSION

1. Deceased Employee Family Support

Envoy Textiles has a comprehensive, compassionate policy to support the families of employees who pass away while in service. This program is designed to provide immediate relief and ensure long-term financial stability, reflecting our core values of compassion and responsibility.

2. Educational Scholarship Program

We offer scholarships to the children of our employees to support their educational growth. To date, 112 students have benefited from this program, with 34 currently receiving support, helping to uplift the socio-economic conditions of our employees' families.

3. Inclusive Employment

As an equal opportunity employer, we proactively prioritize the inclusion of people with disabilities. Currently, 18 individuals with disabilities are employed across various divisions within our factory.



4. Fair Price Shop

We operate a fully digitalized Fair Price Shop on-site, providing employees with access to essential, quality goods at affordable rates. The shop, which includes a one-month credit facility, has significantly reduced living expenses and enhanced financial well-being since its launch in July 2023.

C. ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION & SUSTAINABILITY

1. Bio-Gas Distribution Initiative

We convert domestic organic waste into biogas, distributing stoves to local households. This initiative promotes clean energy, reduces reliance on conventional fuels, and improves community waste management.

2. Resource Management & Biodiversity

- **a. Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP):** Operates a fully functional ETP that ensures only treated water is discharged into the environment. The company actively reuses most of this treated water for internal processes.
- **b. Rainwater Harvesting:** Harvests and stores rainwater to create an independent water supply for firefighting and other non-potable uses, reducing reliance on external sources.

c. Ecological Contributions: Our commitment to biodiversity includes:

- i. A rabbit farm, with rabbits released into Bangabandhu Safari Park to support local wildlife.
- ii. A fish farm within the factory lake.
- iii. Installation of 400 bird nests to ensure safe habitats and providing a temporary home for migratory birds.
- iv. Establishment of an eco-park within the factory premises.
- v. A joint venture aquaponic project (soil-less plant cultivation).

3. Tree Plantation Campaigns

We actively promote environmental awareness by distributing saplings to school students. In 2019, we distributed 10,000 plants across ten local schools, followed by another 5,000 plants in 2021.

During the year 2025, Envoy Textiles distributed 10,000 plants to students from 11 local schools in Bhaluka, Mymensingh.

D. PUBLIC AWARENESS & EDUCATION

1. Public Health Awareness Campaigns

We have launched targeted leaflet distribution campaigns to educate the public on critical health and safety issues:

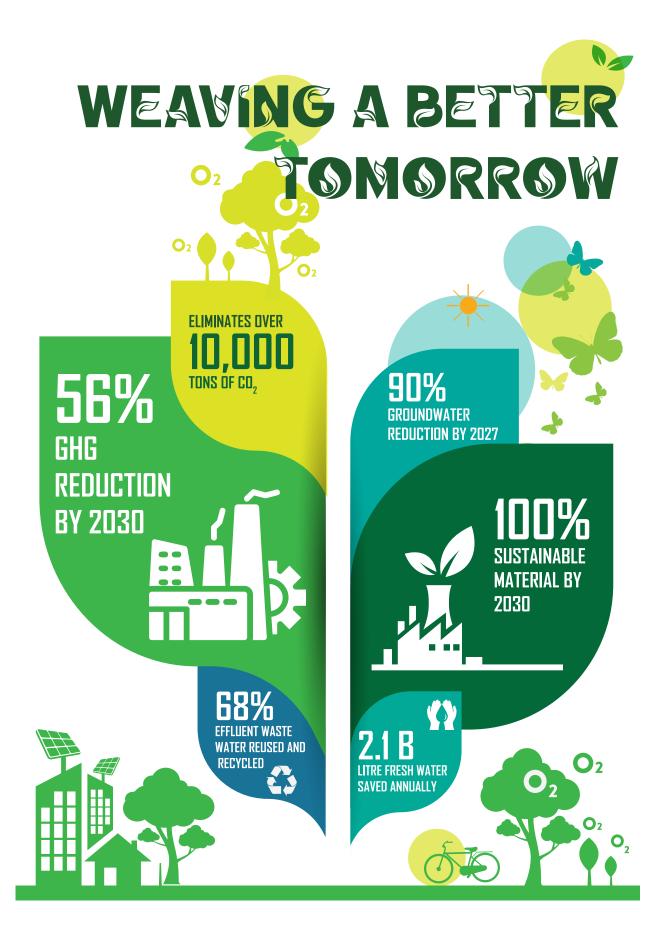
- a. Dengue Prevention: Distributed over 5,000 leaflets.

- b. Study Tours: Regularly host and arrange educational tours for students and professionals from various disciplines and organizations.
- c. Annual Art Competition: Conducts an annual art competition for children in the factory neighborhood, providing materials, prizes, and displaying the winning artwork on our walls for a year.

The diverse initiatives detailed in this report underscore Envoy Textiles Limited's holistic and deeply integrated approach to corporate citizenship. From life-saving medical interventions and inclusive employment practices to pioneering environmental conservation, we are committed to creating sustainable value for all our stakeholders. We will continue to seek new opportunities to strengthen our positive impact as a responsible corporate leader in Bangladesh.

Envoy Textiles Limited has successfully completed the Kontoor Indigood® Water Program Maintenance Assessment, supporting its leadership in sustainable denim production. The review, conducted by Pure Strategies evaluated Envoy's progress in reducing freshwater consumption and improving water efficiency against the program's rigorous benchmarks.



Key Achievements:

- Water Savings: Achieved 65.4% reduction in freshwater use compared to the 2018 baseline.
- Efficiency Gains: Average water use per meter of fabric reduced to 35.9 liters, down from 78.3 liters in 2018.
- Recycling Performance: Recycled water use increased to 24.5%, supporting circular water management.
- Steam Reduction: Steam usage per meter of fabric decreased by 64% from the baseline, with a further 40% improvement since the initial assessment.
- Production Growth: Fabric production increased by 72% since 2018, while water usage decreased, demonstrating decoupling of growth from resource consumption.

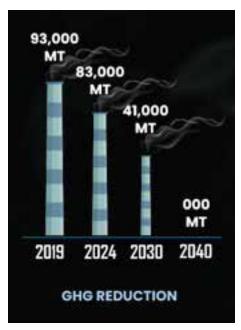


Image: GHG Reduction Roadmap to Net-zero 2040

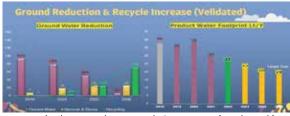


Image of reduce ground water trends, increase recycle and reusable water consumption to reach water reduction goal.

STATEMENT ON CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Corporate governance is the system by which companies are directed and controlled by management in the best interest of all stakeholders, thereby ensuring greater transparency and better and timely financial reporting.

The Board of Directors is responsible for proper governance, which includes setting out the company's strategic aims, providing the necessary leadership to implement such aims, supervising the management of the business, and reporting to the shareholders on their stewardship.

Envoy Textiles is committed to continually reviewing all corporate governance policies and practices to ensure the ongoing transparency of the company's practices and the delivery of right information to stakeholders. The maintenance of effective corporate governance remains a key priority of the Board of Envoy Textiles Limited.

Envoy Textiles asserts that its corporate governance practices adhere to all aspects of the BSEC Corporate Governance Code 2018 and subsequent amendments. In its commitment to maintaining high standards of corporate governance, the company also incorporates best governance practices in its activities.

Date of this Corporate Governance Statement

This Corporate Governance Statement reflects the corporate governance and other related policies and practices in place for Envoy Textiles Limited as of 30 June 2025

Board of Directors

Composition

The Board of Envoy Textiles considers that its membership should comprise Directors with an appropriate mix of skills, experience, and personal attributes. This allows the directors, individually and the Board collectively, to efficiently and effectively discharge their responsibilities and duties under the law, understand the business of the Company, and assess the performance of the management.

The composition of the Board embraces diversity. The Directors have a range of local and international experience, expertise, and specialized skills that assist with decision-making and leading the company for the benefit of shareholders.

The Board of Envoy Textiles consists of eleven Directors, including three Independent Directors, who possess a wide range of skills and experience across various professions and businesses. Each Director brings independent judgment and considerable knowledge to effectively perform their roles. The Board of Directors ensures that the activities of the Company are always conducted with strict adherence to the highest possible ethical standards and in the best interests of the stakeholders.

Retirement and Re-election of Directors

According to the Articles of Association of the company, at least one-third of the directors are required to retire every year. The retiring directors shall be those who have served the longest in the office since their last election. In the case of individuals appointed as directors on the same day, their retirement shall be determined by lot, unless they agree otherwise. However, they will remain eligible for re-election.

Independent Directors

The three Independent Directors mentioned below were initially appointed in accordance with the Order of the Hon'ble High Court Division of the Supreme Court of Bangladesh, passed on 9 March 2023, in the Company Matter 202 of 2022. Their appointments were subsequently approved in the 27th Annual General Meeting held on 24 August 2023, following the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee and appointment by the Board for a 3-year term:

1. Ambassador Syed Shahed Reza, is an Independent Director of the Company. He is a dynamic personality, holding a Master's degree in Public Administration from Dhaka University, with diverse experience in diplomatic affairs, education, social, cultural, and sports fields. He held a position as a member of the Senate at Dhaka University. Previously, he served as the Ambassador of Bangladesh to Kuwait and the Republic of Yemen and held the position of President of Dhaka Club.

He has worked as the National Chancellor for the Bangladesh Chapter of the International Association of Educators for World Peace (IAEWP), affiliated with NGOs such as UN (ECOSOC), UNDP, UNICEF, UNESCO, and UNCEO.

He is also an active sports organizer, currently serving as the Secretary-General of the Bangladesh Olympic Association, in addition to having previously held leadership positions in various prestigious sports organizations. He received the National Award in 2014 for his outstanding performance as a sports organizer.



Mr. Shahed is known for his strong relationships with corporate and political entities at home and abroad.

2. Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed, FCMA, FCA, is the Independent Director of the Company. Mr. Ahmed, the son of Late Mr. Abdur Rahman, was born in 1963 into a respectable Muslim family in Comilla. His early education began in Comilla, where he attended Comilla Zilla School and Victoria Govt. College. He obtained a B. Com (Hons.) in Accounting and an M. Com (Accounting) from the University of Dhaka in 1983 and 1984, respectively. He is a Certified Chartered Accountant and Auditor, as well as a Certified Cost and Management Accountant and Auditor. He is recognized as a fellow member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Bangladesh (ICAB) and the Institute of Cost & Management Accountants of Bangladesh (ICMAB).

Currently, he serves as the Managing Director of the Newage Group Companies, reputable business conglomerates involved in export-oriented manufacturing of knit fabrics and garment accessories.

Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed is also engaged as an Adjunct Faculty Member in the Department of Business Studies at the State University of Bangladesh, teaching MBA and EMBA programs.

With over 32 years of professional experience in the field of finance and accounts, Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed possesses the ability to manage complex projects, excellent organizational skills, and an active professional network of relevant contacts within the local business communities. Throughout his various positions, companies under his leadership have experienced significant expansion and achieved the status of being one of the leading companies in their respective sectors.

3. Barrister Muhammad Shafiqur Rahman,
Barrister-at-Law and an Advocate of the Supreme
Court of Bangladesh, is the Independent Director of
the company. After obtaining an LLB (Hons.) and
an LLM from the University of Dhaka, Mr. Shafiqur
Rahman went to England to study law at the
University of London, where he achieved a second
Honours degree in law. He completed his bar
vocational course at the University of Northumbria
at Newcastle, earning a 'very competent' grade. He
became a member of Lincoln's Inn and was called
to the bar in 2002. Upon returning to Bangladesh,
he joined the Chambers of Dr. M. Zahir, a
prominent corporate and constitutional expert in
Bangladesh, and remained with him until Dr.

Zahir's unfortunate demise in 2013. Mr. Shafiqur Rahman enjoyed the benefits of working in Dr. Zahir's prestigious corporate chambers, which included dealing with large multinational corporate clients such as Chevron, Lafarge, Youngone, Procter and Gamble, British American Tobacco, US Fibres, Haewae, Cathay Pacific, as well as prominent local clients like Berger, MJL Bangladesh Ltd., Grameenphone, Renata, IIDFC, IDLC, ACI, ONE Bank, AB Bank, LankaBangla Finance, Independent University, American International University, HRC Shipping, and others.

While mainly practicing as a litigator in the Supreme Court, Mr. Shafiqur Rahman also engages in opinion writing, drafting contracts, and vetting legal documents as part of his daily routine. His main areas of practice include Admiralty, Corporate, Commercial, Securities, Banking, Insurance, Judicial Review (Writ), and Arbitration. He serves as the Legal Retainer of the Dhaka Stock Exchange, providing advice on capital market and securities law. He works for several Protection and Indemnity (P & I) Clubs, including Standard Club Europe, Standard Club Asia, Swedish Club Hong Kong, and Japan P & I Club. He regularly contributes legal articles to the law journal "Bangladesh Legal Times". He is frequently appointed as an "amicus curiae" by the Company Bench of the High Court Division in critical cases to assist the court in arriving at correct judicial decisions.

Female Independent Director

The Board of Directors, at its 246th meeting on 25 September 2025, appointed **Professor Tanzina Haque, FCMA**, as an Independent Director for a three-year term.

In line with the company's commitment to upholding the highest standards of corporate governance and bringing diverse expertise to the Board, the Nomination and Remuneration Committee (NRC), at its 28th meeting held on 9 August 2025, conducted a thorough review of Professor Haque's credentials. Following this detailed assessment, the NRC unanimously recommended her appointment.

To ensure full regulatory compliance, an application seeking the necessary approval for this appointment, along with all supporting documents, was submitted to the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission (BSEC). We are pleased to report that the BSEC has granted its formal consent for this appointment.

Professor Haque is a distinguished academic and a seasoned professional. She is a Professor at the



University of Dhaka with over 21 years of teaching experience in the Department of Accounting and Information Systems. Her academic qualifications include a Master of Business Administration from the University of Dhaka and a Master of International Business from the University of Melbourne, Australia. Furthermore, she is a Fellow Cost and Management Accountant (FCMA), a testament to her professional excellence. The Board has confirmed that Professor Haque meets all the stipulated requirements for an Independent Director under the BSEC Code and has fulfilled all necessary compliance obligations. In accordance with the BSEC notification and relevant laws, this appointment is now presented to the esteemed shareholders for their valuable confirmation at the upcoming 30th Annual General Meeting (AGM).

None of the Independent Directors hold any shares of the Company.

Role and Responsibilities of the Board

The Board is committed to the Company, aiming to achieve superior financial performance and long-term prosperity while meeting stakeholders' expectations of sound corporate governance practices. The Board of Directors has full control over the Company's affairs and is fully accountable to the shareholders.

They firmly believe that the Company's success largely depends on credible corporate governance practices. With this in mind, the Board of Directors sets out its strategic focus and oversees the business and related affairs of the Company. The Board also formulates strategic objectives and a policy framework for the Company.

Chairman of the Board

The Chairman of the Board is usually elected to the office of Chairman by the directors. The Board considers that the Chairman is independent. The Chairman is a non-executive director.

Role of the Chairman

The Chairman, who is a non-executive director, oversees the Board and serves as the primary link between the Board and management. They work closely with the Managing Director and Company Secretary to set the agenda for Board meetings. The Chairman is responsible for providing leadership to the Board and ensuring its effective functioning in fulfilling its responsibilities as Directors of the Company.

The Chairman of the Board and the Managing Director of the Company are two different

individuals. The Chairman is not the Chief Executive of the Company. The roles of Chairman and Managing Director are independent and separate.

Role of the CEO

The CEO holds the responsibility of establishing and executing the Company's operating plan, which is crucial for achieving the Company's objectives. In addition to this, the CEO serves as a coach, working closely with executives to enhance their contributions by improving their efficiency and effectiveness.

Conduct for the Board Members

The Board of Directors of Envoy Textiles is dedicated to upholding the highest standards of conduct in all their interactions with employees, buyers, members, shareholders, regulators, and the public.

Board Meeting

Board Meeting Practices

The Company shall conduct its Board meetings, record accurate minutes of these meetings, and maintain the necessary books and records in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bangladesh Secretarial Standards (BSS) as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Secretaries of Bangladesh (ICSB).

The Board of Directors of the Company convenes meetings on a regular basis at the Company's Registered Office and also utilizes online platforms for simultaneous participation. These meetings occur at least once every quarter and are essential for the Board to fulfill its responsibilities and execute its functions. To ensure efficient coordination, each meeting is scheduled well in advance, and written notices are provided to every director by the Company Secretary.

Number of Board meeting held in the financial year 2024-25

A total of Ten meetings of the Board were held during the accounting year, and the attendance of directors at those meetings is disclosed in Annexure-IV of the Directors' Report. At least five directors' presence is required to constitute a quorum.

Role of the Company Secretary

The Company Secretary collaborates with the Chairman of the Board to oversee and improve corporate governance processes, ensuring diligent tracking of Board policies and procedures.



Role of the Chief Financial Officer

The Chief Financial Officer (CFO) is a versatile individual adept at navigating an ever-evolving set of circumstances. His primary responsibilities encompass overseeing the Company's finance, general accounts, and treasury functions. Additionally, the CFO participates in all board meetings and delivers presentations on quarterly and periodic results.

Moreover, it is the CFO's duty to certify the financial statements and financial transactions of the Company to the board, ensuring compliance with the corporate governance guidelines issued by the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission (BSEC).

Role of the Head of Internal Audit and Compliance

The Head of Internal Audit and Compliance is responsible for reporting to the Audit Committee regarding any deviation from accounting and internal control system of the Company. He is also responsible for ensuing regulatory compliance of the Company.

Top Level Executive

Structure

The Company's management structure is comprised of division heads, led by the CEO. These top-level executives hold the responsibility of developing organizational and business strategies, as well as promoting innovation and the implementation of best practices throughout the company. They are also accountable for ensuring organizational effectiveness and nurturing the values and culture of Envoy Textiles.

In addition to these roles, the top-level executives are responsible for managing performance and addressing key business issues in accordance with the company's long-term strategy. By effectively overseeing these areas, they contribute to the continued growth and success of the organization.

Performance & Remuneration of Top-Level Executives

The CEO bears the responsibility of defining financial targets, operational objectives, and management goals for the division heads. Performance management for all senior executives includes a combination of short-term and long-term goals. Long-term goals are closely tied to the company's overarching vision, while short-term goals are typically aligned with specific company objectives.

Every quarter, the Chairman and CEO conduct a thorough performance review of the senior executives, assessing their progress in relation to these goals. This comprehensive evaluation fosters accountability and facilitates ongoing improvement across the organization.

The remuneration of all senior executives is determined through a performance review appraisal system that incorporates annual Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). This system serves as the basis for measuring their performance. The Nomination & Remuneration Committee of the Board oversees the performance and remuneration of top-level executives.

The committee assesses the performance of these executives in line with the established KPIs and ensures that the remuneration aligns with their contributions and achievements. This comprehensive process enables fair and transparent evaluation, supporting the company's commitment to rewarding excellence and driving sustained success.

Board Committee

The Board has established two Board Committees to assist advice and make recommendations to the Board on matters falling within their respective responsibilities.

Audit Committee

The Company's Audit Committee is a sub-committee of the Board of Directors of Envoy Textiles Limited. It was formed in compliance with the BSEC Corporate Governance Code 2018 dated on 3 June 2018, Ref. No.

#BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80, and subsequent amendment dated on 16 October 2023 thereon, Ref. No. # BSEC/CMRRCD/2009-193/66 /PRD/148 and adheres to international best practices on Corporate Governance.

Objectives of the Audit Committee

The principal function of the Audit Committee is to exercise and have an oversight over the Company's risk management, financial reporting and regulatory compliance functions.

Composition of Audit Committee

An Audit Committee, consisting of three Independent Directors, with one serving as Chairman, and three non-executive Directors as member, has been established in accordance with the BSEC guidelines to ensure good governance practices. Throughout the reporting year, the Audit Committee of the Board conducted five meetings,



thoroughly reviewing the scope of internal and external audits.

With over 32 years of professional experience in the field of finance and accounts, Mr. Fakhruddin Ahmed possesses the ability to manage complex projects, excellent organizational skills, and an active professional network of relevant contacts within the local business communities. Throughout his various positions, companies under his leadership have experienced significant expansion and achieved the status of being one of the leading companies in their respective sectors.

The Audit Committee and Internal Audit

Internal Audit is the division within Envoy Textiles that is responsible for reviewing the Company's system of internal controls, including the conduct of regular audits of all operational units. Internal Audit is operationally independent and its members are not involved in the company's operational activities and in that the Head of Internal Audit, in addition to his direct reporting line to the Chairman & CEO, also has access to the Audit Committee.

The Audit Committee is responsible for approving the annual audit plan of Internal Audit Division and reviewing the plan's subsequent implementation.

Internal Audit Reports or summaries thereof prepared by Internal Audit Division are reviewed on a regular basis by the committee.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT TO THE SHAREHOLDERS

DEAR SHAREHOLDERS:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 184 of the Companies Act, 1994, Rule 14 (and the schedule provided therein) of the Securities and Exchange Rules 2020, and the Bangladesh Securities & Exchange Commission Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80 dated 03 June 2018 regarding compliance with the Corporate Governance Code 2018, and subsequent amendment thereon dated: 16 October 2023 No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2009-193/66/PRD/148, the Board of Directors takes great pleasure in submitting its Report to the Shareholders for the year ended 30 June 2025, as outlined in the following paragraphs:

INDUSTRY OUTLOOK

The global denim market is projected to grow steadily, reaching \$76.1 billion by 2026. Bangladesh is brilliantly positioned to capture this growth, having solidified its role as the top denim supplier to the EU and a key player in the US market. This success is driven by massive local investment exceeding Tk 25,000 crore, creating a large-scale, modern manufacturing base.

The future outlook is positive, but strategic shifts are required. The key opportunity lies in moving beyond basic denim production to capture a larger share of the high-value and premium segments. To maintain competitiveness, the industry must focus on achieving greater operational excellence, improving energy efficiency, and fostering a supportive policy environment. By executing this strategy, Bangladesh is poised to transition from a volume leader to a value leader in the global denim industry.

The global denim industry is navigating a period of significant transformation, shaped by evolving consumer preferences and an intensified focus on sustainable, resilient supply chains. In this dynamic landscape, Bangladesh has firmly established itself as a denim manufacturing powerhouse, having been the top denim exporter to the European Union since 2017. Today, one out of every three people in the EU wears denim pants produced in our country, a testament to our scale and

reliability. This leadership extends to key markets worldwide, with Bangladesh surpassing China as a leading supplier to both the EU and the United States.

The foundation for this success is built upon substantial local investment, which now exceeds Tk 25,000 crore in the denim segment. This capital infusion has expanded our manufacturing base from around 12 mills a decade ago to 42 modern mills with an annual production capacity of over 900 million metres of denim fabric. This strategic capacity enhancement positions Bangladesh perfectly to capture a larger share of the expanding global denim market, which is projected to grow from \$64.5 billion to \$76.1 billion by 2026 at a robust annual rate of 4.8%. Our local exporters, currently supplying nearly \$5 billion worth of denim products worldwide, are poised to benefit directly from this growth, especially as demand continues to rise due to fashion trends emphasizing comfort and flexibility.

The outlook is further strengthened by growing confidence from global buyers. Beyond the traditional EU and US markets, new destinations such as India, Japan, Latin America, and the Middle East are emerging as promising growth frontiers. Besides, Bangladesh is rapidly shedding its image as a low-cost hub and is now regarded as a strategic partner by major brands like Levi's, H&M, and Zara. This shift is underpinned by our world-leading commitment to sustainability, with over 200 LEED-certified green factories—many dedicated to denim—employing advanced technologies like laser finishing and waterless dyeing to meet stringent environmental standards.

Looking ahead, our strategic focus must be on moving up the value chain. While we dominate the volume-driven basic denim segment, a significant opportunity lies in capturing a larger share of the high-value and premium denim markets. Our counter-strategy must be to balance production between basic and high-end items, continuously improving our capabilities in design and complex washes to gain buyer trust for these more lucrative orders. Concurrently, achieving operational excellence is paramount. We must enhance workforce and machinery efficiency and



implement strategic energy-saving interventions to mitigate operational costs and navigate the unstable energy scenario. The current banking environment also necessitates supportive government policies and a collaborative, unified approach as a nation to maintain our international competitiveness.

The industry's trajectory is profoundly positive. By leveraging our scale, investing in innovation, and driving operational efficiency, we are confident that Bangladesh is well-positioned not only to ride the wave of global growth but to actively shape the future of denim, delivering enhanced value to our shareholders and reinforcing our position as the world's denim leader.

THE STATE OF THE COMPANY'S AFFAIRS

- 100% export-oriented LEED Platinum denim fabric manufacturer with Rope Dyed Technology, commenced commercial operation in 2008
- Installed production capacity of 52 million yards of denim fabrics per annum
- State-of-the-art Spinning Plant with a capacity of 25,000 MT of cotton yarn per year, commenced operations in 2016
- Blended yarn production plant, started commercial operation in 2023, with a capacity of 4,200 MT of yarn per year, using a significant proportion of cotton substitute raw materials.

Envoy Textiles Limited is a 100% export-oriented denim fabric manufacturer and the first denim project in Bangladesh to employ Rope Dyed Technology. The company currently has an installed production capacity of 52 million yards of denim fabrics per annum.

A remarkable milestone for the company is its achievement of the LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Platinum score. This notable distinction sets Envoy Textiles apart as the first textile manufacturer in Bangladesh and the world's first denim manufacturer to reach such an environmental standard. The LEED Platinum score reflects the company's unwavering commitment to ensuring a workplace that prioritizes maximum environmental safety.

Since its commercial operation in 2008, the company has experienced significant growth. It began its commercial operations with an initial production capacity of 16 million yards per annum. However, through strategic expansion efforts, Envoy Textiles has effectively multiplied its capacity by more than threefold.

Presently, the company's optimal running capacity exceeds its installed capacity. Its product offerings span a wide range of denim fabrics, catering to different recipe variations, colors, and shades, ranging from 4.5 oz to 14.75 oz. Envoy Textiles prides itself on its dedication to product development, constantly leveraging research and innovation to meet the needs of the upper market segment.

In addition to its denim manufacturing capabilities, Envoy Textiles operates its own state-of-the-art Spinning Plant for the production of Cotton Yarn. This plant, located within the same compound as the Denim Factory in Bhaluka, Mymensingh, boasts a production capacity of 25,000 MT of yarn per year. Since its commercial operation commenced towards the end of 2016, the Spinning Plant has effectively utilized its installed capacity. The majority of the yarn produced is consumed in-house, demonstrating the company's vertical integration and self-sufficiency.

The company has recently established a blended yarn project, which involves producing yarn using a significant proportion of cotton substitute raw materials. In recent decades, there has been a rise in the share of man-made fibers compared to natural fibers.

The project commenced commercial operation on 1 April 2023, with a capacity of 4,200 MT yarn production per year. The project is equipped with state-of-the-art European and Japanese machinery, and the production facility occupies a floor space of 75,000 square feet within the existing factory premises. Approximately 60 to 70% of the production is utilized internally for denim production, with the remaining portion allocated to the deemed export market.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

The growth of the Bangladesh Denim Industry, being an export-oriented sub-sector, is heavily reliant on the economic stability of importing countries. However, several factors pose significant risks to the industry's survival and competitiveness. These include the possibility of an economic recession, volatile cotton prices in the international market, infrastructural bottlenecks, strict government policies on textile exports, and political unrest, all of which expose the industry to systematic risks. The ongoing gas crisis and frequent energy price hikes further exacerbate the challenges faced by the industry, making it difficult to remain competitive.

Besides, the turmoil in the Red Sea has resulted in a significant rise in sea freight costs, rendering business operations more expensive for local manufacturers. Moreover, the global demand for denim products has experienced a notable decline owing to the economic recession. These factors exacerbate the industry's challenges.

To address these risks and concerns, the company is proactive in implementing systematic controls. One significant market risk is the competition faced from established manufacturers in countries such as China, India, Pakistan, Cambodia, and Vietnam. India and Pakistan, in particular, have become attractive to international buyers due to their devalued local currencies against the US dollar and cost advantages resulting from their cotton production. Moreover, Pakistan enjoys a GSP

facility in the EU market. As the cost of manufacturing in China rises, buyers are increasingly considering more cost-efficient alternatives like Bangladesh.

However, the Bangladesh Denim Textile Industry has a competitive advantage. With a well-developed garment infrastructure and a continuous focus on upgrading the skills of human resources, the industry is capable of producing high-quality and cost-competitive products.

Demand risk is another concern, as the expected growth in demand for denim products is not being met. The younger generation's preference for electronic gadgets over fashionable denim wear, as well as seasonal variations in demand due to climate changes, have contributed to this situation. Financial risk exists, and the company acknowledges the uncertainties associated with the use of estimates in the preparation of financial statements, as disclosed in the Financial Statements.

The volatility of cotton prices in the world market presents a raw material price risk. To mitigate this risk, the company procures cotton during the harvesting period, ensuring sufficient stock to cover price fluctuations throughout the year.

Foreign exchange risk is minimal, as payment for raw materials is set-off by export proceeds in the same foreign currency. Any fluctuations in foreign exchange rates are adjusted through natural hedges.



OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

The Company operates in the production of denim fabrics and yarns, offering a wide range of options including diverse recipes, colors, weights, and fashion variations. This product line represents the entirety of our business.

Our revenue is derived from multiple sources. The core revenue stream is generated through deemed exports, achieved by supplying export-oriented local Ready-Made Garments (RMG) against back-to-back Letters of Credit (LC). Also, we directly export fabrics to over 15 countries, which constitutes approximately 7-15% of our total production.

Furthermore, a portion of our revenue comes from various sources. We receive cash incentives from the government as a reward for our export activities. This provides an additional boost to our earnings. There is insignificant revenue generated from the sale of sample fabrics, wastage, or stock

fabric sales. We also engage in exporting dyed yarn through export-oriented local knit RMG, contributing to our overall revenue.

As an export-oriented company, we recognize any gains or losses resulting from foreign exchange fluctuations in a separate category within our revenue. This allows us to account for the impact of currency fluctuations on our financials accurately.

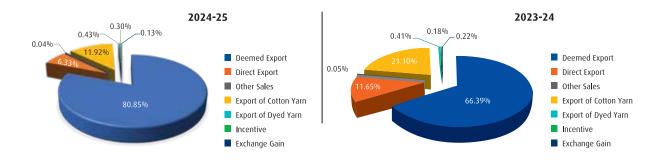
In terms of our yarn production, approximately 25-30% of the yarn manufactured at our Spinning Unit is exported to local export-oriented denim fabric manufacturers. This enables us to diversify our revenue streams and cater to the specific needs of these manufacturers.

Our revenue segment showcases the breadth of our operations, from deemed exports and direct fabric exports to various auxiliary revenue sources and strategic partnerships within the textile industry.

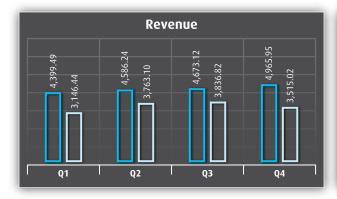
Revenue Segment in Graph

Quarter-by-Quarter Performance Analysis

The following report provides a detailed, quarter-by-quarter analysis of our performance, highlighting the drivers behind our success and the strategic context for our investments.

First Quarter:

The year began with explosive growth, setting a confident tone for the quarters to follow.

- Revenue Growth: 39.82% (BDT 4,399.49 million vs. BDT 3,146.44 million)
- Gross Profit Growth: 73.54%
- Net Profit Growth: 133.98%

The growth was primarily fueled by a significant increase in export orders and a favorable foreign currency exchange rate. Our strategies for export competitiveness and effective management in a dynamic global market proved highly successful.

The growth in Gross Profit significantly outpaced revenue, indicating enhanced production efficiency and improved capacity utilization.

Second Quarter:

We maintained strong, double-digit growth while laying the groundwork for future expansion.

- Revenue Growth: 21.87% (BDT 4,586.24 million vs. BDT 3,763.10 million)
- Gross Profit Growth: 69.64%
- Net Profit Growth: 158.85%

Growth was driven by our enhanced international market positioning and expansion into new customer segments. We continued to reap the benefits of economies of scale and cost-saving initiatives. It is important to note that this quarter saw a rise in financial expenses, a conscious decision to fund project expansion and production enhancement



Third Quarter:

Amidst rising global input costs, our operational resilience ensured continued high growth.

• Revenue Growth: 21.80% (BDT 4,673.12 million vs. BDT 3,836.82 million)

 Gross Profit Growth: 32.10% Net Profit Growth: 107.97%

This quarter demonstrated our ability to thrive despite external pressures. Strong international demand and successful expansion strategies drove revenue. The solid Gross Profit growth, achieved in a challenging cost environment, is a testament to our energy efficiency initiatives and strategic raw material procurement.

Fourth Ouarter:

We finished the year with our strongest quarterly revenue growth, a fitting end to a record-breaking vear.

• Revenue Growth: 41.28% (BDT 4,965.95 million vs. BDT 3,515.02 million)

Gross Profit Growth: 47.07%

• Net Profit Growth: 147.53%

The sharp revenue acceleration was driven by strong demand and successful year-end commercial strategies. While we achieved tremendous profit growth, this quarter also revealed some emerging cost pressures, particularly in factory overhead and gas bills. Besides, a strategic increase in Selling & Distribution expenses points to our continued

investment in marketing and logistics to secure future growth. Most importantly, we successfully managed our financial expenses downward compared to the previous quarter.

The FY 2024-25 results are a clear validation of our long-term strategy. Our focus on export diversification, operational efficiency, and strategic global expansion has yielded outstanding returns.

As we look at FY 2025-26, we are mindful of the evolving economic landscape, including global inflationary pressures and fluctuations in currency markets. However, we enter the new year from a position of strength. The investments we have made—from our new US liaison office to our production enhancement projects—have positioned us for sustained growth.

- 2. Integrating Strategic Investments: Ensuring our recent expansions in marketing and production deliver their full potential.

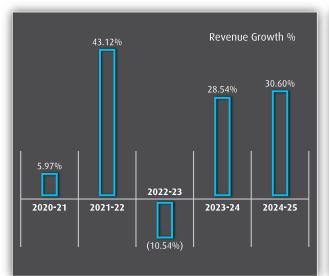

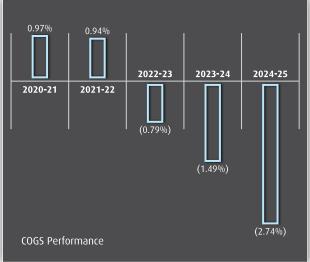


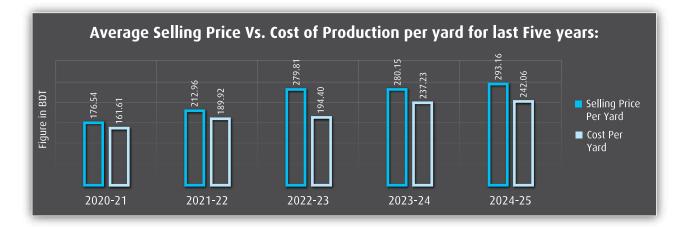

Detailed Analysis of Financial Results Exceptional Revenue Growth

Revenue surged to BDT 18,624.80 million, a remarkable growth of 30.60% from the previous year. This was primarily fueled by a surge in international demand for denim fabrics. Our manufacturing units rose to the occasion, operating beyond their installed capacity and achieving over 100% capacity utilization. Fabric sales volume grew by an impressive 39.40%, with denim fabric sales increasing to 55.41 million yards from 39.75 million yards in the previous year, reflecting our ability to capitalize on favorable market conditions.

Enhanced Profitability and Strategic Margin Expansion

The most significant achievement this year is the substantial expansion of our profit margins, driven by strategic cost management.

Gross Profit Margin: Gross Profit increased by 52.67% to BDT 3,526.52 million. The Gross Profit Ratio improved to 18.95% from 16.20%. This 2.75 percentage point improvement was a key driver of profitability.

Strategic Cost Efficiency: We achieved a significant improvement in cost efficiency, with COGS as a percentage of revenue declining to 81.07% from 83.80%. This was primarily due to strategic procurement that secured lower raw material costs and the powerful benefit of scale from our increased production volume. These gains effectively offset headwinds from increased gas tariffs, demonstrating our ability to manage costs proactively in a dynamic environment.

Net Profit Margin: Net Profit After Tax skyrocketed by 134.66% to BDT 1,408.90 million. The Net Profit Ratio recorded a significant increase, rising to 7.56% from 4.21%. This powerful conversion of top-line growth into bottom-line results demonstrates our enhanced operational efficiency and effective overall cost control.

Prudent Financial Management

Financial expenses increased by 11.59% to BDT 1,375.31 million. It is important to view this increase in the context of our growth. This rise is attributable to financing strategically secured for our project expansion and production

enhancement initiatives. While interest rates have risen, these investments are essential for scaling our operations to meet future demand. The fact that we achieved a 134.66% growth in net profit despite this increase is a strong indicator that the return on these invested funds is highly positive.

The record profitability has directly fortified our balance sheet and enhanced value for our shareholders.

- Earnings Per Share (EPS): EPS increased to BDT 8.40, up from BDT 3.58, reflecting the substantial growth in earnings attributable to each shareholder.
- Net Asset Value (NAV) Per Share: NAV per share grew by 12.30% to BDT 58.32, indicating a stronger underlying financial foundation driven by accumulated retained earnings.
- Net Operating Cash Flow Per Share (NOCFPS): Increased to BDT 4.77 from BDT 3.68. This demonstrates that our core business operations are generating more robust cash flows, ensuring operational liquidity and financial stability through improved collections and working capital management.

The fiscal year 2024-25 has been a landmark period for your company. We successfully capitalized on strong market demand, optimized our operations to unprecedented efficiency levels, and significantly improved our profitability metrics. The dramatic rise in Net Profit and the strengthened financial position are a clear validation of our business strategy and the dedication of our team.

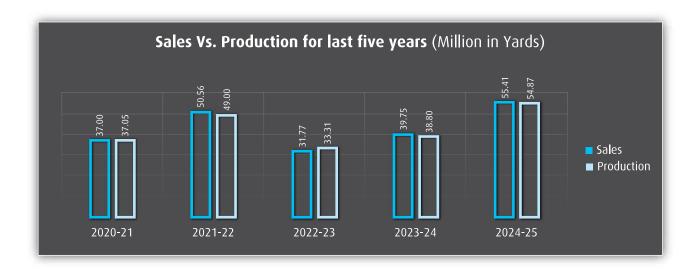

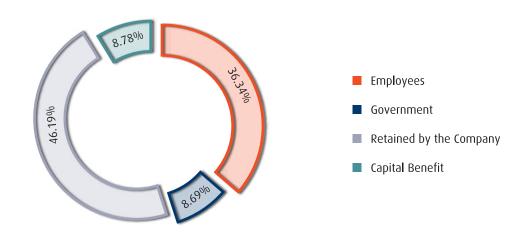

According to the BSEC directive, the Independent Service Provider will offer a hybrid platform for conducting the 30th Annual General Meeting and facilitating e-voting.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE COMPLIANCE AUDIT

Pursuant to the provision of BSEC Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80 dated 3 June 2018, the Board of Directors appointed M/S Haruner Rashid & Associates, Chartered Secretaries & Management Consultants, as the practicing Professional Accountant to conduct the Corporate Governance Compliance Audit of the Company for the financial year ended 30 June 2025.

The Corporate Governance Compliance Audit Report and its corresponding Certificate are attached herewith as 'Annexure VIII & IX'. The Compliance Audit report does not include any qualifications, reservations, or adverse remarks.



STATUS OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE COMPLIANCE

The status of compliance with the conditions imposed by the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission's Notification No. BSEC/CMRRCD/2006-158/207/Admin/80 dated 3 June 2018, and amendments thereon dated 16 October 2023 is enclosed as 'Annexure VII, VIII & IX'.

GOING CONCERN

The Directors, after conducting necessary inquiries, are confident that no significant uncertainties that raise doubts about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern have been identified. They reasonably expect that the Company possesses sufficient financial resources to sustain its operations for the foreseeable future. Hence, these financial statements have been prepared based on the going concern assumption.

UTILIZATION OF PROCEEDS FROM PUBLIC ISSUES

The Company conducted its Initial Public Offering (IPO) in 2012. The funds raised from the public offerings have been completely utilized and duly reported.

FINANCIAL RESULTS AFTER PUBLIC ISSUE OF **SHARES**

The Company initiated its public offering of shares in 2012. Over the reporting financial years, the revenue has exhibited a gradual increase since the public issue. However, the profitability has declined in the past three years due to factors such as high-power costs, rising raw material expenses, and the adverse impact of low demand caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Nevertheless, the Company has successfully managed to rebound and overcome the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic in the year 2021-22

Apparel demand in the US and EU has indeed experienced a significant decrease over the past year, largely attributed to the economic slowdown resulting from the ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict. This decline has been further compounded by other factors, such as elevated interest rates and inflation, significantly influencing consumer behavior. As a result, the net profit for the year 2022-23 has been impacted by these factors.

Revenue surged significantly in the fiscal year 2023-24, driven by strong demand from major buyers in Europe and the USA. As a result, net profit saw an impressive increase of 83.45% compared to the previous year.

In the fiscal year 2024-25, the company experienced a period of remarkable financial acceleration following a post-pandemic stabilization phase. Revenue growth surged dramatically by 30.60%, a performance primarily fueled by a significant increase in international demand for denim fabrics. This robust market appetite enabled our manufacturing units to operate beyond their installed capacity, achieving utilization rates of over 100%. This powerful operational performance culminated in a Net Profit After Tax (NPAT) of BDT 1,408.90 million, representing an exceptional 134.66% leap and demonstrating the successful return on our strategic investments in production capability and market positioning.

MINORITY INTEREST

The Company ensures the protection of minority shareholders' interests by preventing any abusive actions undertaken by controlling shareholders, whether directly or indirectly. Additionally, effective mechanisms for redress are in place to address any concerns or grievances.

During the year 2024-25, the Board did not make any decisions that could potentially harm the interests of minority shareholders.

ADB LOAN FACILITY

We are pleased to inform you that the Company has secured the sanction of a sustainability-linked loan facility of USD 30 million from the Asian Development Bank (ADB). This landmark agreement, which represents ADB's first sustainability-linked loan in Bangladesh, has a tenure of up to seven years, including an 18-month grace period.

The loan proceeds will be utilized to finance an expansion of our yarn production by 4,550 MT per year, fund the installation of 3.5 MWp rooftop solar modules, and refinance existing local working capital loans. Repayment will be made in 12 equal semi-annual installments, commencing after the grace period.



This strategic partnership is expected to significantly advance our environmental sustainability initiatives while simultaneously supporting the Company's industrial modernization and profitability. In addition to the profit expected from the extension of the blended yarn production facility, we will achieve substantial savings in financial expenses by offsetting local loans. For your information, this new facility is distinct from our existing ADB loan of USD 11 million sanctioned in 2023, the outstanding amount of which stood at BDT 1,021.21 million as of the end of the last financial year.

The Board is confident that this financing will greatly contribute to the Company's long-term growth and value creation.

STATUS OF ISSUANCE OF PREFERENCE SHARES

In line with the Company's strategic objectives to optimize its capital structure and fund growth initiatives, the Board has utilized the instrument of preference shares to secure financing under favorable terms.

Our first issuance in 2019 successfully raised Taka 320 million through 32 million preference shares. The proceeds were pivotal in supporting our capital investment in BMRE projects and reducing high-cost debt, thereby strengthening our financial foundation. We are pleased to report to the shareholders that this initial tranche of preference shares has been **fully redeemed** as planned.

To further fuel the Company's expansion and enhance profitability, a second private placement was executed in 2022, raising Taka 870 million through the issuance of 87 million preference shares. These funds were strategically allocated to finance our venture into blended yarn production and to prepay another portion of high-cost borrowing. These shares, like the previous issuance, are fully redeemable, cumulative, and non-convertible, with redemption occurring in semi-annual, equal installments on an arrear basis.

As of June 30, 2025, the outstanding balance of preference shares stands at BDT 348.00 million. The Board remains committed to a disciplined approach to capital management and will continue to ensure the timely redemption of these instruments in accordance with their terms.

ISSUANCE OF ZERO-COUPON BOND

In a continued effort to diversify our funding sources and secure long-term, cost-effective capital, the Company successfully issued a 5-year Zero-Coupon Bond with a face value of BDT 2,000.00 million through a private placement in 2022.

This strategic financing instrument was pivotal in funding two critical objectives: the development of our Captive Power Plant and the prepayment of a portion of our high-cost borrowing.

The bond is being redeemed in accordance with its scheduled repayment plan. As of June 30, 2025, the outstanding balance of the bond stands at BDT 950.74 million. The Board is fully committed to the prudent management of our liabilities and will ensure the continued timely redemption of this instrument.

MANAGEMENT APPRECIATION

The Board of Directors expresses its deep appreciation for the outstanding performance of the management, officers, staff, and workers.

Despite the challenges posed by natural and unnatural factors affecting production and marketing both locally and globally, their unwavering efforts have resulted in increased productivity and net profit. The Board expects the employees and management to continue their pursuit of improvement, keeping the shareholders' interests in mind. The trust shown by shareholders in the management has always been a great source of inspiration for the Board of Directors.

The Directors extend their gratitude and acknowledge with great interest the cooperation and unwavering support received from various agencies, including the Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission, Stock Exchanges, National Board of Revenue, Bangladesh Investment Development Authority (BIDA), Bank/Financial Institutions, and other public agencies.

ডেনিম শিল্পের বর্তমান অবস্থা

বিশ্ব ডেনিম বাজারের আকার ২০২৬ সাল নাগাদ ৭৬.১ বিলিয়ন ডলারে পৌছানোর সম্ভাবনা রয়েছে। ইউরোপীয় ইউনিয়ন এবং মার্কিন বাজারে একটি প্রধান সরবরাহকারী দেশ হিসেবে বাংলাদেশ এই প্রবৃদ্ধি কাজে লাগানোর জন্য অনন্য অবস্থানে রয়েছে। এই শিল্পে এ পর্যন্ত ২৫,০০০ কোটি টাকারও বেশি টাকার স্থানীয় বিনিয়োগ হয়েছে; যা এই সাফল্যের মূল ভিত্তি। ভবিষ্যতের জন্য আমাদের কৌশলগত ফোকাস করতে হবে

কোম্পানীর বিষয়াদির অবস্থা

এনভয় টেক্সটাইল্স লিমিটেড বার্ষিক ৫২ মিলিয়ন গজ উৎপাদন ক্ষমতাসম্পন্ন বাংলাদেশে স্থাপিত প্রথম রোপ ডাইয়িং প্রযুক্তির শতভাগ রপ্তানীমূখী ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদনকারী একটি প্রতিষ্ঠান। বর্তমানে কোম্পানীর উৎপাদন তার স্থাপিত সক্ষমতাকে অতিক্রম করেছে।

কোম্পানী ২০০৮ সালে বার্ষিক ১৬ মিলিয়ন গজ ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদন ক্ষমতা নিয়ে বানিজ্যিক উৎপাদন শুরু করে এবং এযাবৎ সময়ে এ উৎপাদন ক্ষমতা তিনগুনের অধিক উন্নীত হয়েছে। এনভয় টেক্সটাইলস লিমিটেড লীড প্লাটিনাম সার্টিফাইডধারী একটি প্রতিষ্ঠান। এ অর্জন বাংলাদেশের টেক্সটাইলস উৎপাদনকারী প্রতিষ্ঠানের এবং বিশ্বের ডেনিম উৎপাদনকারী প্রতিষ্ঠানের মধ্যে সর্বপ্রথম, যা কোম্পানীর সর্বোচ্চ পরিবেশগত নিরাপত্তার নিশ্চয়তা বিধান করে।

8.৫ আউন্স থেকে ১৪.৭৫ আউন্সের বিভিন্ন প্রকারের ফেব্রিক্স বর্তমানে উৎপাদন করা সম্ভব, যার পরিমাণ সর্বোচ্চ বাৎসরিক প্রায় ৫০ মিলিয়ন গজ। গবেষনা ও উৎকর্ষ সাধনের মাধ্যমে ফেব্রিক্সের গুনগত মান ও বৈচিত্রতা সৃষ্টি করে উন্নত বাজার দখল করাই কোম্পানীর অন্যতম লক্ষ্য।

কারখানা প্রাঙ্গণের অভ্যন্তরে বাৎসরিক ২৫ হাজার মেট্রিক টন সূতা উৎপাদনের সক্ষমতায় কোম্পানীর একটি নিজস্ব স্পিনিং মিল আছে।

২০১৬ সাল থেকে এই কারখানা হতে বানিজ্যিকভাবে সূতা উৎপাদন শুরু হয় এবং বর্তমানে দৈনিক উৎপাদন শ্বমতার শতভাগ পরিমান সূতা উৎপাদিত হচ্ছে, যার সিংহভাগই মানসম্মত কোম্পানীর নিজস্ব ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদনে ব্যবহৃত হয়। কোম্পানী ২০২৩ সালে একটি ব্লেন্ডেড ইয়ার্ন উৎপাদন মিল চালু করেছে। যেখানে কটনের পাশাপাশি কটন-বিকল্প কাঁচামালের সংমিশ্রনে ইয়ার্ন উৎপাদিত হচ্ছে। এ মিল থেকে বছরে প্রায় ৪,২০০ মেট্রিক টন ইয়ার্ন উৎপাদন হয়ে থাকে। এ কারখানাটি অত্যাধুনিক ইউরোপিয় এবং জাপানী যন্ত্রপাতি দিয়ে সজ্জিত, বিদ্যমান কারখানার প্রাঙ্গণে অবস্থিত। এ কারখানা থেকে উৎপাদিত ইয়ার্নের প্রায় ৭০ শতাংশ নিজস্ব ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্স উৎপাদনে ব্যবহৃত হচ্ছে এবং অবশিষ্টটুকু সরাসরি বা প্রচ্ছন্নভাবে রপ্তানি হচ্ছে।

ঝুঁকি ও এর অবস্থান

বাংলাদেশের ডেনিম শিল্প যেহেতু রপ্তানীমূখী একটি শিল্প, যার সাফল্য বহুলাংশে আমদানীকারক দেশ সমূহের অর্থনৈতিক স্থিতিশীলতার উপর নির্ভরশীল। বৈশ্বিক অর্থনীতিতে মন্দা, আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে তুলার মূল্যে উঠানামা, অবকাঠামোগত সীমাবদ্ধতা, সরকারী নীতি ব্যবস্থাপনা এবং রাজনৈতিক অস্থিরতা এ শিল্পকে দারুনভাবে প্রভাবিত করতে পারে।

এছাড়া, লৌহিত সাগরে পণ্যবাহি জাহাজ চলাচলে সৃষ্ট সমস্যার কারণে পণ্য পরিবহন খরচ উল্লেখ্যযোগ্য ভাবে বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে, যা ব্যবসায়িক কার্যক্রমকে আরো ব্যয়বহুল করে তুলেছে। অধিকম্ভ, অর্থনৈতিক মন্দার কারণে ডেনিম পণ্যের বৈশ্বিক চাহিদা উল্লেখ্যযোগ্য ভাবে হ্রাস পেয়েছে।

গ্যাসের স্বল্পতা এবং সাম্প্রতিক সময়ে কয়েক দফায় জ্বালানীর মূল্য বৃদ্ধির কারনে পণ্যের উৎপাদন ব্যয় বৃদ্ধি পাওয়ায় এ শিল্প ইতিমধ্যে দারুনভাবে আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে প্রতিযোগীতার সম্মুখীন হচ্ছে এবং নিজেদের অন্তিত্ব টিকিয়ে রাখার লড়াই করছে। যার ফলশ্রুতিতে দেশীয় উৎপাদনকারীরা প্রতিযোগিতার সক্ষমতা হারাচ্ছে। অধিকন্ত, করোনা ভাইরাস প্রাদুর্ভাবে সমুদ্রপথে জাহাজ ভাড়া সাম্প্রতিক সময়ে অনেক বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে। এছাড়া ভাইরাসের প্রাদুর্ভাবে ফেব্রিক্সের আন্তর্জাতিক চাহিদা দৃশ্যমানভাবে হাস পেয়েছে।

কোম্পানী এর নিম্নোক্ত বিভিন্ন ঝুঁকির বিষয়ে সজাগ রয়েছে এবং এসব ঝুঁকি মোকাবিলায় প্রয়োজনীয় নিয়ন্ত্রনমূলক ব্যবস্থাধীনে আছে ঃ

শিল্পপণ্যের বাজারজনিত ঝুঁকি

বাংলাদেশকে আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে চীন, ভারত, পাকিস্তান, কম্বোডিয়া ও ভিয়েতনামের মতো প্রতিষ্ঠিত রপ্তানীকারক দেশগুলোর সাথে প্রতিযোগীতা করতে হয়। ইতিমধ্যে ভারত ও পাকিস্তানে ডলারের বিপরীতে দেশ দুটির স্থানীয় মুদ্রা অবমূল্যায়িত হওয়ায় আন্তর্জাতিক ক্রেতাদের নিকট এসব দেশ থেকে আমদানীকৃত ডেনিম পণ্যমূল্য সাশ্রয়ী হচ্ছে। সূতা উৎপাদনকারী দেশ হওয়াতে এদেশ দু'টির পণ্য উৎপাদন খরচ তুলনামূলক ভাবে কম থাকে। এছাড়াও পাকিস্তান ইউরোপীয় ইউনিয়নের বাজারে শুল্কমূক্ত পণ্য রপ্তানী সুবিধা পেয়েছে। অন্যদিকে চীনে ডেনিম পণ্যের উৎপাদন ব্যয় বৃদ্ধির ফলে আন্তর্জাতিক ক্রেতারা অন্যান্য মূল্য সাশ্রয়ী দেশের পাশাপাশি বাংলাদেশমূখী হচ্ছে।

এছাড়া বাংলাদেশের একটি সমৃদ্ধ তৈরী পোষাক শিল্প রয়েছে এবং ধারাবাহিক মানবসম্পদ উন্নয়নের মাধ্যমে উন্নত মানের মূল্যসাশ্রয়ী পণ্য উৎপাদনে বাংলাদেশ ইতিমধ্যে সক্ষমতা অর্জন করেছে, যা বাজারঝুঁকি মোকাবিলায় একটি নিয়ামক শক্তি।

চাহিদাজনিত ঝুঁকি

বর্তমানে বিশ্বের তরুণ সমাজ পছন্দসই ডেনিম সামগ্রী ক্রয়ের পরিবর্তে অত্যাধুনিক যোগাযোগ-প্রযুক্তি পণ্যের দিকে অধিক ঝুকে পড়ায় ডেনিম পণ্যের আশান্বিত চাহিদার প্রবৃদ্ধি হচ্ছে না। এছাড়াও কোন কোন বছরে জলবায়ু পরিবর্তনের প্রভাবে সৃষ্ট ঋতু বৈচিত্রের তারতম্যে ডেনিম পণ্যের চাহিদা ব্যাপক ভাবে হ্রাস-বৃদ্ধি হতে পারে।

বৈদেশিক মুদ্রার বিনিময়হারজনিত ঝুঁকি

যেহেতু সম বৈদেশিক মূদ্রায় কাঁচামালের ক্রয় মূল্য পরিশোধিত হয় পণ্যের রপ্তানী আয় থেকে, ফলে বৈদেশিক মুদ্রার বিনিময় হারের তারতম্য স্বাভাবিকভাবে সমন্বয় হয়ে যায় এবং এ ঝুঁকি খুবই নগন্য।

রাজস্ব খাত

কোম্পানী বিভিন্ন প্রকারের শুধুমাত্র ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্সই উৎপাদন ও রপ্তানী করে থাকে। কোম্পানীর মুনাফা একাধিক খাত থেকে অর্জিত হয়। কোম্পানীর রাজস্বের প্রধান উৎস হলো ব্যাক টু ব্যাক এলসির বিপরীতে রপ্তানীমুখী স্থানীয় পোশাক শিল্পের মাধ্যমে প্রচ্ছন্ন রপ্তানী আয়।

পরিচালনগত আর্থিক ফলাফলে প্রভাব বিস্তারকারী গুরুত্বপূর্ণ বিষয়সমূহ ঃ

এই বছরটি ছিল অসাধারণ সাফল্য এবং কৌশলগত অর্জনের বছর, যেখানে রাজস্ব আয় ও লাভজনকতা উল্লেখযোগ্য হারে বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে, যা কোম্পানির সক্ষমতা এবং কার্যক্রমের দক্ষতা তুলে ধরে।

আমাদের মূল পণ্য, বিশেষ করে ডেনিম ফ্যাব্রিকের বিশ্বব্যাপী একটি অনুকূল বাজার পরিবেশ বিরাজমান ছিল। আরও গুরুত্বপূর্ণ হলো, আমাদের কার্যক্রমের উচ্চ দক্ষতা এবং কৌশলগত খরচ ব্যবস্থাপনার মাধ্যমে এই চাহিদা শুধু পূরণই নয়, বরং অতিক্রম করে এই সক্ষমতার সুযোগগুলোকে অসাধারণ ভাবে কাজে লাগিয়েছে। নিচের প্রতিবেদনে গত বছরের তুলনায় আমাদের কার্যদক্ষতার বিস্তারিত বিশ্লেষণ দেওয়া হল।

আর্থিক ফলাফলের বিস্তারিত বিশ্লেষণ

অসাধারণ আয় বৃদ্ধি

রাজস্ব আয় বেড়ে দাঁড়িয়েছে ১৮,৬২৪.৮০ মিলিয়ন টাকায়, যা গত বছরের তুলনায় উল্লেখযোগ্য হারে ৩০.৬০ শতাংশ বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে। এটি প্রাথমিকভাবে ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্সের জন্য আন্তর্জাতিক চাহিদা বৃদ্ধির কারণে হয়েছে। আমাদের স্থাপিত উৎপাদন ক্ষমতাকে ছাড়িয়ে আমরা অধিক উৎপাদন ক্ষমতাকে কাজে লাগাতে সক্ষম হয়েছিলাম। ফেব্রিক বিক্রয়ের পরিমাণ ৩৯.৪০ শতাংশ বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে, যেখানে ডেনিম ফেব্রিক্সের বিক্রয় গত বছরের ৩৯.৭৫ মিলিয়ন গজ থেকে বেড়ে ৫৫.৪১ মিলিয়ন গজে পৌছেছে, যা অনুকূল বাজার অবস্থার সদ্ব্যবহার করার আমাদের ক্ষমতাকে প্রতিফলিত করে।

কৌশলগত ব্যবস্থাপনায় লাভের হার বৃদ্ধি

এই বছরের সবচেয়ে বড় অর্জন হল কৌশলগত খরচ ব্যবস্থাপনার মাধ্যমে আমাদের লাভের হার সন্তোষজনক ভাবে বৃদ্ধি পায়।

মোট লাভ মার্জিনঃ মোট লাভ ৫২.৬৭ শতাংশ বৃদ্ধি পেয়ে ৩,৫২৬.৫২ মিলিয়ন টাকায় দাঁড়িয়েছে। মোট লাভের হার ১৬.২০ শতাংশ থেকে বেড়ে ১৮.৯৫ শতাংশ হয়েছে। মোট লাভের ২.৭৫ শতাংশ প্রবৃদ্ধি কোম্পানীর মুনাফা অর্জনের একটি প্রধান চালিকাশক্তি ছিল।

কৌশলগত ব্যয় দক্ষতাঃ আমরা সফলভাবে ব্যয় দক্ষতা অর্জন করতে পেরেছি, যেখানে বিক্রিত পণ্যের উৎপাদন ব্যয় ৮৩.৮০ শতাংশ থেকে কমে ৮১.০৬ শতাংশ হয়েছে। এটি প্রাথমিকভাবে কৌশলগত ক্রয়ের মাধ্যমে কাঁচামালের খরচ কমানো এবং আমাদের উৎপাদন বৃদ্ধির সক্ষমতার সুবিধার কারণে হয়েছে। আমরা সফল ব্যয় নিয়ন্ত্রনের মাধ্যমে জ্বালানী বাবদ ব্যয়ীত অতিরিক্ত খরচকে সমন্বয় করতে পেরেছি।

নিট লাভের হারঃ কর-পরবর্তী নিট লাভ ১৩৪.৬৬ শতাংশ বেড়ে ১,৪০৮.৯০ মিলিয়ন টাকায় পৌছেছে। নিট লাভের হার বেড়ে ৪.২১ শতাংশ থেকে ৭.৫৬ শতাংশ হয়েছে। নিট লাভের এই অনুপাত বৃদ্ধি আমাদের কার্যকর পরিচালনা দক্ষতা এবং সামগ্রীক ব্যয় নিয়ন্ত্রনের দক্ষতাকে প্রকাশ করে।

দক্ষ আর্থিক ব্যবস্থাপনা

আর্থিক ব্যয় ১১.৫৯ শতাংশ বৃদ্ধি পেয়ে ১,৩৭৫.৩১ মিলিয়ন টাকায় দাঁড়ালেও আমাদের রাজস্ব আয়ের তুলনায় আর্থিক ব্যয় কিন্তু বাড়েনি। এই আর্থিক ব্যয় বেড়েছে বর্ধিত উৎপাদন ক্ষমতাকে কাজে লাগানো এবং প্রকল্প সম্প্রসারণের নিমিত্তে গৃহীত ঋণ বাবদ ব্যয় বৃদ্ধির কারনে।

যদিও সুদের হার বেড়েছে, তবুও ভবিষ্যৎ চাহিদা পূরণে সক্ষমতা বাড়াতে এসব বিনিয়োগ অত্যন্ত গুরুত্বপূর্ণ। উল্লেখযোগ্য বিষয় হলো আর্থিক ব্যয় বাড়লেও কোম্পানির নিট মুনাফা বেড়েছে ১৩৪.৬৬%, যা প্রমাণ করে যে এই বিনিয়োগ থেকে আমরা অত্যন্ত ইতিবাচক রিটার্ন পেয়েছি।

শেয়ার প্রতি আয় (EPS)ঃ ইপিএস বেড়ে ৩.৫৮ টাকা থেকে ৮.৪০ টাকায় দাঁড়িয়েছে, যা প্রতিটি শেয়ারের বিপরিতে সম্ভোষজকন আয় অর্জনকে প্রতিফলিত করে।

শেয়ার প্রতি নেট সম্পদ মূল্য (NAV)ঃ প্রতি শেয়ারে নেট সম্পদ মূল্য ১২.৩০ শতাংশ বৃদ্ধি পেয়ে ৫৮.৩২ টাকায় হয়েছে, যা কোম্পানীর একটি শক্তিশালী আর্থিক ভিত্তিকে প্রতিফলিত করে।

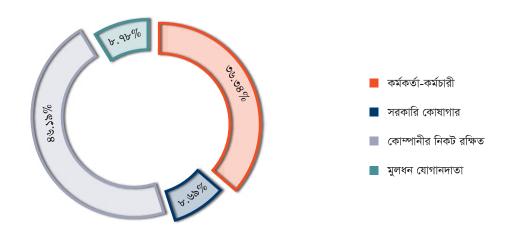

চলমান ব্যবসা

চলমান ধারাবাহিকতায় কোম্পানীর সক্ষমতা নিয়ে পরিচালকদের নিকট সন্দেহের উদ্রেক হয়নি এবং অবিরত ব্যবসা পরিচালনার জন্য প্রয়োজনীয় আর্থিক সক্ষমতা রয়েছে বলে তাঁরা যুক্তিসংগত ভাবে আশা করেন। এ কারনে চলমান ব্যবসার ভিত্তিতে আর্থিক হিসাব বিবরণী প্রস্তুত করা হয়েছে।

লিস্টিং পরবর্তী আর্থিক ফলাফল

কোম্পানিটি ২০১২ সালে প্রথমবারের মতো শেয়ার বাজারে প্রবেশ করে। সেই সময় থেকে কোম্পানির আয় ধীরে ধীরে বৃদ্ধি পেয়েছে। তবে, গত তিন বছরে লাভের পরিমাণ কিছুটা কমে গেছে। এর প্রধান কারণ হলো উচ্চ বিদ্যুৎ খরচ, কাঁচামালের দাম বৃদ্ধি এবং কোভিড-১৯ মহামারির কারণে চাহিদা হ্রাস।

তবুও, ২০২১-২২ অর্থবছরে কোম্পানি কোভিড-১৯-এর প্রভাব কাটিয়ে সফলভাবে পুনরুদ্ধার করতে সক্ষম হয়।

যুক্তরাষ্ট্র ও ইউরোপীয় ইউনিয়নের বাজারে পোশাকের চাহিদা গত বছরে কমে যায়, যা মূলত রাশিয়া-ইউক্রেন যুদ্ধের কারণে সৃষ্ট অর্থনৈতিক মন্দার ফল। এর সঙ্গে সুদের হার ও মুদ্রাক্ষীতি বৃদ্ধিও ক্রেতাদের ক্রয়ক্ষমতায় প্রভাব ফেলে। ফলে ২০২২-২৩ অর্থবছরে কোম্পানির নিট লাভে কিছুটা পতন ঘটে।

২০২৩-২৪ অর্থবছরে ইউরোপ ও যুক্তরাষ্ট্রের বড় ক্রেতাদের কাছ থেকে ব্যাপক অর্ডার পাওয়ার কারণে রাজস্ব বা আয় উল্লেখযোগ্যভাবে বেড়ে যায়। এর ফলে আগের বছরের তুলনায় নিট লাভ বেড়ে যায় ৮৩.৪৫%।

২০২৪-২৫ অর্থবছরে কোম্পানি মহামারি-পরবর্তী স্থিতিশীলতা অর্জনের পর এক দুর্দান্ত আর্থিক প্রবৃদ্ধি লাভ করে। রাজস্ব বা আয় বেড়ে যায় ৩০.৬০%। এ প্রবৃদ্ধির প্রধান নিয়ামক ছিল ডেনিম কাপড়ের আন্তর্জাতিক বাজারে ব্যাপক চাহিদা বৃদ্ধি। এবছর স্থাপিত উৎপাদন ক্ষমতার শতভাগ উৎপাদন দক্ষতাকেও ছাড়িয়ে গেছে।

এই অসাধারণ কার্যসম্পাদনের ফলে কর-পরবর্তী নিট মুনাফা দাঁড়ায় ১,৪০৮.৯০ মিলিয়ন বাংলাদেশি টাকায়, যা আগের বছরের তুলনায় ১৩৪.৬৬ শতাংশ বেশি। কোম্পানির উৎপাদন সক্ষমতা ও বাজারে কৌশলগত বিনিয়োগের ফলাফল অত্যন্ত সফল ভাবে বাস্তবায়িত হয়েছে।

সংখ্যালঘুদের স্বার্থ রক্ষা

কোম্পানি সংখ্যালঘু শেয়ারহোল্ডারদের স্বার্থ রক্ষায় প্রতিশ্রুতিবদ্ধ। উদ্যোক্তা শেয়ারহোল্ডারদের দ্বারা সরাসরি বা পরোক্ষভাবে কোনো ধরনের অপব্যবহার বা অনুচিত কর্মকাণ্ড রোধে প্রয়োজনীয় পদক্ষেপ গ্রহণ করা হয়। এছাড়া, সংখ্যালঘু শেয়ারহোল্ডারদের যেকোনো অভিযোগ বা উদ্বেগ নিরসনের জন্য কার্যকর ব্যবস্থাও বিদ্যমান।

২০২৪-২৫ অর্থবছরে পরিচালনা পর্ষদ এমন কোনো সিদ্ধান্ত গ্রহণ করেনি, যা সংখ্যালঘু শেয়ারহোল্ডারদের স্বার্থের পরিপন্থী হতে পারে।

এশিয়ান ডেভেলপমেন্ট ব্যাংক-এর ঋণ সুবিধা

আমরা সানন্দের সাথে জানাতে চাই, সম্প্রতি এশিয়ান উন্নয়ন ব্যাংক (এডিবি) আমাদের কোম্পানিকে ৩০ মিলিয়ন মার্কিন ডলারের একটি সাসটেইনেবিলিটি-লিংকড ঋণ সুবিধা অনুমোদন দিয়েছে, যা বাংলাদেশে এডিবির প্রথম উদ্যোগ হিসেবে একটি গুরুত্বপূর্ণ মাইলফলক। সাত বছরের মেয়াদী এই ঋণে ১৮ মাসের গ্রেস পিরিয়ড অন্তর্ভুক্ত রয়েছে। প্রাপ্ত অর্থ ব্যবহার করা হবে বাৎসরিক ৪,৫৫০ মেট্রিক টন সুতা উৎপাদন ব্যবস্থার সম্প্রসারণ, ৩.৫ মেগাওয়াট-পিক সক্ষমতার ফ্যাক্টরির ছাদে সৌর বিদ্যুৎ স্থাপন, এবং বিদ্যমান উচ্চসুদের গৃহীত স্থানীয় ব্যাংক ঋণ পরিশোধের কাজে।

এই কৌশলগত অংশীদারিত্ব কোম্পানির পরিবেশবান্ধব উদ্যোগ, শিল্প আধুনিকায়ন ও মুনাফা বৃদ্ধিতে উল্লেখযোগ্য ভূমিকা রাখবে। ব্লেভেড সূতা উৎপাদন সম্প্রসারণ থেকে প্রত্যাশিত আয়ের পাশাপাশি স্থানীয় ঋণ পরিশোধের মাধ্যমে আর্থিক ব্যয় হ্রাসেও সহায়তা করবে। উল্লেখ্য, এই নতুন সুবিধাটি ২০২৩ সালে গৃহীত এডিবির ১১ মিলিয়ন মার্কিন ডলারের বিদ্যমান ঋণ সুবিধার অতিরিক্ত একটি নতুন ঋণ সুবিধা। ৩০ জুন ২০২৫ তারিখে বিদ্যমান এডিবি ঋণের সর্বশেষ স্থিতি ছিল ১,০২১.২১ মিলিয়ন টাকা।

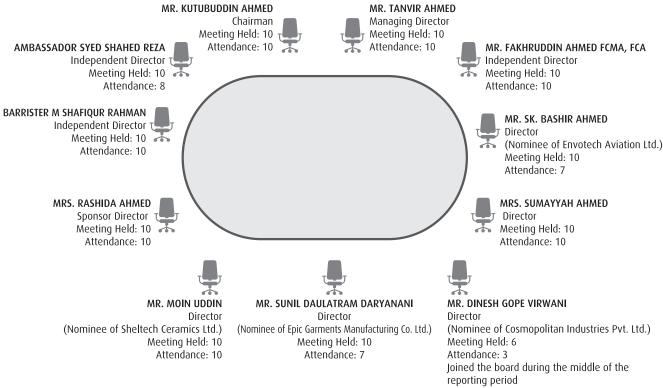

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

On behalf of the management and the Board of Directors, it is with immense pride that I present this review of our Company's landmark performance for the fiscal year 2024-25. This year stands as a powerful testament to our strategic resilience, operational excellence, and our ability to capitalize decisively on global market opportunities. We have not only achieved exceptional growth but have also significantly strengthened our financial foundation, delivering record value to you, our shareholders.

This report covers the operations and financial performance of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2025

OVERALL REVIEW

Bangladesh has firmly cemented its position as the world's leading denim exporter to the European Union and a top supplier to the United States. The country's denim exports continue to demonstrate robust growth, with its share in the global denim trade now estimated at over 26%, a clear testament to its expanding influence and competitive strength.

This leadership is underpinned by massive domestic capacity. The sector now boasts investments exceeding BDT 250 billion, supported by approximately 40-42 advanced mills. These facilities have an annual production capacity of over 900 million meters of denim fabric, marking a significant leap from a decade ago and creating a powerful, integrated supply chain.

Bangladesh has consistently outpaced China as the top denim supplier to the EU, holding a market share of over 30%. In the US market, it remains a dominant force, competing closely with other major suppliers. While the EU and USA remain the primary destinations, accounting for nearly 70-75% of exports, the industry is successfully diversifying. Emerging markets like Japan, South Korea, India, Australia, and Latin America are becoming increasingly important, mitigating reliance on traditional Western markets.

A defining trend in Bangladesh's denim sector is the strategic shift beyond basic volume production. There has been a monumental surge in investment toward eco-friendly, LEED-certified factories. Bangladesh is now the global leader in green garment factories, with a good number of its denim mills achieving top sustainability certifications. This commitment extends to adopting water-saving techniques, laser and ozone finishing technologies, and the use of recycled cotton and organic fibers.

This pivot is not just about environmental stewardship; it is a critical business strategy to align with the stringent Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) standards demanded by major global brands like Levi's, H&M, and Inditex. However, adopting these greener technologies and sustainable processes has increased production costs.

A critical challenge for manufacturers is the stagnation of product prices despite rising costs for energy, sustainable compliance, and finance. Buyers are often reluctant to absorb these increased costs, squeezing profit margins and creating an urgent need for price realignment that reflects the true value of sustainable production.

Looking ahead, maintaining Bangladesh's competitive edge will require a multi-pronged approach. The industry must continue to:

- 1. Invest in Innovation and R&D to move further up the value chain into premium and technical denim products.
- Strengthen the "Sustainable Bangladesh" Brand to justify pricing that covers the cost of compliance and green manufacturing.
- 3. Enhance Operational Efficiency through automation and skill development to mitigate internal cost pressures.
- 4. Aggressively pursue market diversification to reduce vulnerability to economic cycles in Europe and North America.

By balancing its commitment to sustainability with strategic adaptation to global market dynamics, Bangladesh's denim industry is well-positioned to navigate current challenges and ensure its long-term growth and stability.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The past fiscal year has been one of transformational achievement. We successfully translated favorable denim market dynamics into unprecedented financial results, as summarized by our key performance indicators:



- Revenue: BDT 18,624.80 million, a
 30.60% increase from the previous year.
- Gross Profit: BDT 3,526.52 million, a
 52.67% surge.
- **Net Profit After Tax (NPAT):** BDT 1,408.90 million, a **134.66% leap.**
- Earnings Per Share (EPS): BDT 8.40, a 134.66% increase from BDT 3.58.
- Net Asset Value (NAV) Per Share: BDT 58.32, a 12.30% growth.

These figures are not merely numerical gains; they represent the successful execution of a clear strategy focused on scale, efficiency, and value creation.

Analysis of Operational Performance and Strategic Growth

Capitalizing on Strong Global Demand: The primary driver of our growth this year was a **significant surge in international demand for denim fabrics.** Our Company's response was exemplary. Our manufacturing units operated beyond their installed capacity, achieving over 100% utilization. This operational agility allowed us to increase fabric sales volume by an impressive **39.40**%, with denim fabric sales rising to **55.41 million yards** from 39.75 million yards. This demonstrates our critical role as a preferred and reliable partner in the global denim supply chain, driven by the strength of our product and market position.

Strategic Cost Management and Margin Expansion: A cornerstone of this year's success was our strategic focus on margin enhancement. While our total production cost per yard saw industry-wide inflationary pressures, rising to BDT 242.06, we achieved remarkable efficiency at scale.

We strategically improved our **Gross Profit Ratio to 18.95**%, from 16.20%. This was primarily driven by a reduction in the Cost of Goods Sold (COGS) as a percentage of revenue to **81.07**% from 83.80%. Through strategic procurement that secured favorable raw material prices and the powerful economies of scale from our increased production volume, we effectively neutralized cost pressures from increased gas tariffs and other overheads.

This operational leverage flowed directly to the bottom line. **Our Net Profit Ratio reached 7.56%**

from 4.21%. This powerful conversion of top-line growth into bottom-line profit underscores a fundamental improvement in our operational performance and financial discipline.

Strengthened Financial Foundation and Shareholder Value

The record profitability has directly fortified our balance sheet and enhanced value for our shareholders.

- Enhanced Shareholder Value: The
 dramatic rise in EPS to BDT 8.40 reflects
 the substantial earnings generated for
 each of you. Concurrently, our NAV per
 share grew to BDT 58.32, indicating a
 stronger underlying financial foundation
 driven by accumulated retained earnings.
- **Prudent Financial Management:**Financial expenses saw a moderate increase of 11.59% to BDT 1,375.31 million. This was a strategic and necessary step, attributable to financing secured for our project expansion and production enhancement initiatives. The fact that we achieved a 134.66% growth in net profit demonstrates that the return on these invested funds is highly positive and essential for our future growth.
- Robust Operational Cash Flow: It is
 particularly noteworthy that our Net
 Operating Cash Flow Per Share (NOCFPS)
 increased to BDT 4.77. This demonstrates
 that our record earnings are of high
 quality, backed by robust cash generation
 from core operations, ensuring operational
 liquidity and financial stability through
 improved collections and working capital
 management.

We operate in a dynamic global environment marked by economic uncertainties, inflationary pressures, and fluctuating exchange rates. The data on our inflation-adjusted net profit in previous years clearly reflects this volatility. However, our performance in FY 2024-25 proves our enhanced capacity to navigate these challenges.

Our strategy is clear: we will continue to build on this success by:

FIVE-YEAR FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS: A JOURNEY OF RESILIENCE AND STRATEGIC GROWTH (FY 2020-21 TO FY 2024-25)

This analysis provides a retrospective view of our company's financial journey over the last five fiscal years, a period marked by global challenges and significant opportunities. It demonstrates our strategic evolution from navigating volatile markets to achieving breakthrough performance, highlighting the key drivers behind our improving cost structure, operational efficiency, and profitability.

Cost Performance Analysis: Navigating Volatility Towards Efficiency

Our cost structure has undergone a significant transformation, reflecting both external market pressures and our internal strategic responses.

Raw Material Costs: This has been the most volatile component, fluctuating from a low of **BDT 5,004.76 million in FY 2020-21** (driven by lower prices and volumes during the global pandemic) to a high of **BDT 11,817.27 million in FY 2024-25.**

The sharp 32.49% increase in the most recent year was primarily due to more production capacity utilization. However, its proportion of total production costs has remained relatively stable (68%-77%), confirming its status as the dominant, yet managed, cost factor.

Production Overhead & Cost per Yard: Other Production Overhead has shown a consistent upward trajectory, growing from BDT 2,327.65 million in FY 2020-21 to BDT 3,412.42 million in FY 2024-25. This reflects broader inflationary pressures on utilities, gas tariffs, and operational expenses. Consequently, the Cost per Yard has risen sharply by nearly 50% over five years, from BDT 161.61 to BDT 242.06. This metric is the clearest indicator of the inflationary cost environment we have operated in.

Strategic Cost Management Evolution: The most critical insight from our cost analysis is found in the Cost of Goods Sold (COGS) as a percentage of Revenue. Despite rising absolute costs, this ratio has consistently improved, falling from 86.08% in FY 2021-22 to 81.06% in FY 2024-25. This



demonstrates a strategic shift from merely absorbing costs to actively managing them through economies of scale, strategic procurement, and operational efficiencies. Our ability to lower this ratio in the face of rising input costs is a key success story for the past two years.

Operating Performance Analysis: Building Scale and Leverage

Our operational performance reveals a story of recovery, scaling, and enhanced execution.

Revenue Generation and Capacity Utilization:

After a period of stabilization post-pandemic, our revenue growth accelerated dramatically in FY 2024-25 with a 30.60% increase. This was fueled by our ability to operate beyond installed capacity, with fabric sales volume surging **39.40%** to 55.41 million yards. This demonstrates that our investments in production capability and market positioning have created a powerful operational engine capable of capitalizing on high demand.

Gross Profitability: A Clear Turning Point

The Gross Profit Ratio is our most important indicator of core business health. After remaining stable between FY 2020-21 and FY 2021-22, it has begun a strong and steady climb:

FY 2022-23: 14.71%

FY 2023-24: 16.20%

FY 2024-25: 18.93%

This multi-year expansion is a powerful sign that our operational efficiency is improving. We are now generating significantly more profit from every taka of revenue, confirming that our strategy to boost sales volume and manage costs is delivering the results we intended.

Earnings Performance Analysis: From Volatility to Breakthrough Profitability

The journey of our bottom-line earnings highlights our transition from vulnerability to external shocks to creating sustainable, high-quality profits.

Net Profit After Tax (NPAT) and Margins: The five-year trend shows a period of earnings volatility followed by a dramatic breakthrough.

> The Volatile Period (FY 2020-21 to FY 2022-23): NPAT was low and fluctuating, with the Net Profit Ratio ranging from 1.09% to 4.04%. This period reflected the company's sensitivity to raw material costs, inflation, and global supply chain disruptions.

The Strategic Inflection (FY 2023-24 to **FY 2024-25):** We witnessed a transformational leap. The Net Profit Ratio more than doubled from 2.95% in FY 2022-23 to 7.56% in FY 2024-25. The absolute NPAT of BDT 1,408.90 million in **FY 2024-25** is a 134.66% increase from the previous year, underscoring a complete transformation in earnings power.

Earnings Quality and Shareholder Value:

- Earnings Per Share (EPS): Mirroring NPAT, EPS showed volatility in the earlier years but exploded to BDT 8.40 in FY 2024-25. This massive growth directly translates the company's success into tangible value for each shareholder.
- **Inflation-Adjusted Profit:** The restated NP figures reveal that our reported growth in FY 2024-25 is not just nominal but represents strong real economic profit, effectively distancing us from the inflationary pressures that impacted us in previous years.
- Net Asset Value (NAV): The consistent year-on-year growth in NAV per share, culminating at **BDT 58.32**, demonstrates our sustained ability to build shareholder equity and financial stability through retained earnings, even during more challenging periods.

The five-year analysis reveals a clear narrative: We have successfully transformed from a company buffeted by market forces into one that strategically commands them.

The initial years were defined by managing volatility and maintaining stability. The recent two years mark a strategic breakout, where our focused investments in capacity, our relentless pursuit of operational efficiency, and our strategic market positioning have converged. We have broken the historical pattern of rising costs eroding margins, instead using scale and savvy management to expand profitability dramatically.

While we remain vigilant of global economic headwinds, we do so from a position of unprecedented strength. Our proven ability to manage costs, scale operations efficiently, and convert top-line growth into bottom-line results



provides us with great confidence for the future. We are committed to continuing this trajectory of strategic, profitable growth.

PEER ORGANIZATION SCENARIO

To provide a clear context for our financial results, we have conducted a comparative analysis against three key industry peers: Argon Denim, Evince Textiles, and Pacific Denim. The analysis is based on publicly available data from the Dhaka Stock Exchange for the four-year period from 2020-21 to 2023-24.

The findings unequivocally demonstrate our company's superior financial performance and stronger asset base within the industry.

Earnings Power:

Over the reviewed four-year period, our company delivered an **average Earnings Per Share (EPS) of Taka 2.27**. This significantly outpaces the peer group's average EPS of Taka 0.31. Our EPS is **over seven times higher** than the industry average, highlighting our exceptional ability to generate profit for each outstanding share.

Underlying Asset Value:

The strength of our balance sheet is reflected in the Net Asset Value (NAV) per share. Our **average NAV per share stood at Taka 41.63**, substantially exceeding the peer organizations' average of Taka 15.90 for the same period. This indicates that our company has built a more robust foundation of net assets per share, providing greater intrinsic value and financial resilience for our shareholders.

This peer comparison confirms that our strategic focus and operational execution have yielded superior outcomes. We have not only outperformed the industry average but have set a benchmark for profitability and financial stability in the denim and textile sector. This leading position provides a solid platform for sustained future growth and value creation.

RISK AND CONCERNS

The volatility of the currency, particularly against the dollar, poses significant challenges for long-term order bookings. Moreover, there is a consistent increase in cotton prices, as well as other input costs such as power and logistics. The soaring cost of natural gas has made its use as a power source impractical.

The plan for mitigating these risks and concerns

has been outlined in the Directors Report under the section titled 'Risks and Concerns.'

Accounting Policies and Estimations:

Fixed Assets

Property, plant, and equipment (PPE) comprise assets such as factory buildings, equipment, vehicles, and software, which are valued at their historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Some assets, like land and buildings, are measured at fair value in compliance with IAS-16. Depreciation is applied using the reducing balance method, with no depreciation charged on land and capital work-in-progress. Depreciation is applied to other assets when they become available for use.

Intangible assets are acquired and have finite useful lives. They are measured at cost less accumulated amortization and impairment losses, if any. Amortization is based on a reducing balance method over five years from the date they become available for use. No internally developed intangible assets were capitalized during the year.

The company's land was revalued as of 26 June 2024, leading to a revaluation gain of BDT 1.9 billion. This gain was credited to a "Revaluation Surplus" under shareholders' equity. The revaluation was limited to land, and other asset classes remained unchanged.

The company reviews assets for impairment at each reporting date. If the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognized. No assets were found to be impaired during the reporting period.

Subsequent costs related to replacing parts of PPE are recognized in the asset's carrying amount if they are expected to provide future economic benefits and can be measured reliably. No assets were disposed of during the period, but any gain or loss on disposal would be recognized under other income.

Capital work-in-progress represents costs for assets that were not yet ready for use at the end of the year and are stated at cost. Inventories, including raw materials, work-in-progress, and finished goods, are valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and bank deposits with a maturity of three months or less and are free of encumbrances.



Taxation:

The company enjoyed a tax holiday for a duration of four years, starting from 1 March 2008, and ending on 29 February 2012. During the tax holiday period, 40% of the company's net profit was transferred to the tax holiday reserve. After the expiration of the tax holiday period, an appropriate provision has been made for current and deferred tax liabilities, based on the prevailing rate.

Segment Reporting:

Segment reporting is not applicable for the current year, as the company does not meet the criteria required for segment reporting.

Revenue Recognition:

Sales of Goods:

Revenue from the sale of goods shall be acknowledged upon fulfillment of the subsequent criteria:

- a. The company has transferred the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods to the buyer.
- b. The company has relinquished any continuing managerial involvement or effective control over the goods sold.
- c. The amount of revenue can be measured with reliability.
- There is a high likelihood that the economic benefits linked to the transaction will accrue to the company.
- e. The cost incurred or to be incurred for the transaction can be measured with reliability.

Other Income and Expenses:

Other income and expenses are recognized when received.

Foreign Exchange Transactions:

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted into BDT at the exchange rate on the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies are translated into BDT at the exchange rate prevailing at the balance sheet date. Gains or losses resulting from foreign currency transactions are recorded in the profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Financial Expenses:

Borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they are incurred, and any costs incurred before the commencement of commercial operations are capitalized.

Earnings:

This represents earnings for the year attributable to ordinary shareholders. As there were no preference dividends, minority interests, or extraordinary items, the net profit after tax for the period is considered fully attributable to the ordinary shareholders.

Financial Instruments:

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized on the balance sheet when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Accounts Receivables:

Accounts receivables are stated at their nominal value and are considered as good.

Accounts Payables:

Accounts payables are stated at their nominal value, and no bank acceptance is provided as of the reporting date.

Due to and due from Related Parties:

Due to and due from related parties are stated at their nominal value.

Borrowings or Secured Loan:

Bank loans and overdrafts that bear interest are recognized at the amount received as proceeds. Finance charges related to these borrowings are accounted for on an accrual basis.

No changes in accounting policies and estimations were made during the reporting period.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

The fiscal year 2024-25 has been a defining chapter in our Company's history. We have validated our business model, demonstrated exceptional execution, and delivered outstanding returns. The core of our success lies in the strong global demand for our denim fabrics and our unparalleled ability to meet them efficiently. I extend my sincere gratitude to our dedicated colleagues, our supportive Board of Directors, and you, our valued shareholders, for your unwavering trust. We enter the new fiscal year with robust



momentum and great confidence, committed to building on this success to deliver sustained value for years to come.

FORWARD LOOKING

The textile industry has a promising growth potential as Chinese exports are slowing down due to various factors, including increased domestic demand and rising costs. This presents a valuable opportunity for our textile industry to capitalize on. However, challenges such as inadequate power supply, elevated power costs, and higher borrowing expenses are impeding our progress. Nevertheless, we are actively addressing these challenges through continuous efforts to reduce costs, improve processes, diversify our product range, and enhance productivity by optimizing efficiencies.

We are pleased to note that our financial performance has stabilized and is displaying signs of improvement, including increased capacity utilization. This, in turn, has led to enhanced export sales, driven by growing demand in global markets. The performance of our Spinning Division is gradually improving, despite the depressed denim fabric market observed in the past year. We remain hopeful that the denim fabric market will rebound in the current year.

Nonetheless, we maintain a strong sense of optimism for the future and anticipate positive outcomes.

1.1 Board Size:

The number of members on the Board of Directors as of 30 June 2025 stands at 11 (Eleven), including three Independent Directors, which is within the limits specified by BSEC.

1.2 Independent Director:

- (a) The three Independent Directors mentioned below were appointed during the 27th Annual General Meeting held on 24 August 2023, for a three-year term:
- i) Ambassador Syed Shahed Reza is an Independent Director of the Company. He is a dynamic personality, holding a Master's degree in Public Administration from Dhaka University, with diverse experience in diplomatic affairs, education, social, cultural, and sports fields. He held a position as a member of the Senate at Dhaka University. Previously, he served as the Ambassador of Bangladesh to Kuwait and the Republic of Yemen and held the position of President of Dhaka Club.

He has worked as the National Chancellor for the Bangladesh Chapter of the International Association of Educators for World Peace (IAEWP), affiliated with NGOs such as UN (ECOSOC), UNDP, UNICEF, UNESCO, and UNCEO.

He is also an active sports organizer, currently serving as the Secretary-General of the Bangladesh Olympic Association, in addition to having previously held leadership positions in various prestigious sports organizations. He received the National Award in 2014 for his outstanding performance as a sports organizer.

Mr. Shahed is known for his strong relationships with corporate and political

entities at home and abroad. It's worth noting that Ambassador Syed Shahed Reza was already serving as an Independent Director of the Company.

iii) Mr. Muhammad Shafiqur Rahman,
Barrister-at-Law and an Advocate of the

Court-appointed Independent Director.
After obtaining an LLB (Hons.) and an LLM
from the University of Dhaka, Mr. Shafiqur
Rahman went to England to study law at



the University of London, where he achieved a second Honours degree in law. He completed his bar vocational course at the University of Northumbria at Newcastle, earning a 'very competent' grade. He became a member of Lincoln's Inn and was called to the bar in 2002. Upon returning to Bangladesh, he joined the Chambers of Dr. M. Zahir, a prominent corporate and constitutional expert in Bangladesh, and remained with him until Dr. Zahir's unfortunate demise in 2013. 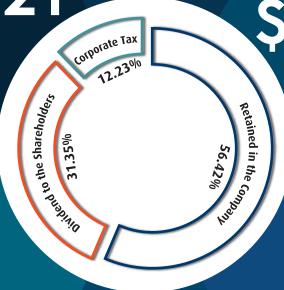

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) and the guidelines issued by Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission (BSEC), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters (KAM)

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements for the current periods. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

1. Property, Plant and Equipment	
See notes 3.06, 5, 6 and 17 to the financial stateme	ent
The key audit matter	How the matter was addressed in our audit.
The carrying value of the Property, Plant and Equipment with intangible assets amounted to Taka 12,327,534,380 (PPE, Intangible Assets) as at 30 June 2025. This represents a significant amount in the Company's statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025. There is risk of: ✓ Determination of fair value in absence of any quoted price and active market require significant judgment. ✓ Determining which costs meet the criteria for capitalization; ✓ Determining the date on which the assets is recognized to property, plant and equipment and depreciation commences.	 Our audit included the following procedures: We checked related accounting treatments of the addition of Property, Plant and Equipment as well as intangibles assets recognized by the Company. We obtained a listing of capital expenditures incurred during the year and, on a sample basis. Checked whether the items were procured based on internal purchase order that had been properly approved by the responsible individuals. We inspected a sample of invoices and L/C documents to determine whether the classification between capital and operating expenditure was appropriate.

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The estimation of economic useful lives and residual values assigned to Property, Plant and Equipment.

We identified the carrying value of property, plant and equipment as key audit matter because of the high level of management judgment involved and because of its significance to the financial statements.

- We evaluated whether the useful lives determined and applied by the management were in line with historical experience and the market practice.
- We checked whether the depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment items was commenced timely, by comparing the date of the reclassification from capital in progress to ready for use, with the date of the act of completion of the work.

Assessing the design, implementation and operating effectiveness of key internal controls over the completeness, existence and accuracy estimation of useful economic lives and residual values of property, plant and equipment;

2. Revenue

See notes 3.12 and 30 to the financial statements

The key audit matter

The Company reported total revenue of Taka 18,624,802,107 for the year ended 30 June 2025.

Revenue is measured including incentives by customers on the Company's sales. Within a number of the Company's markets, estimation of incentives recognized based on sales made during the year is material and considered to be complex and judgmental.

The terms of sales agreements, including the timing of transfer of control, based on the terms of relevant contract and nature of commission, incentive, bonus and discounts arrangements, create complexities that requires judgement in determining sales revenues.

Considering the above factors and the risk associated with revenue recognition, we have determined the same to be a key audit matter.

How the matter was addressed in our audit.

Our audit procedures included the following:

- We assessed the appropriateness of revenue recognition accounting policy in line with IFRS 15 "Revenue from contracts with customers"
- Tested the internal control over financial reporting. We also assessed the existence and accuracy of the sales recorded;
- We performed analytical test to understand how the revenue has trended over the year among other parameters, we performed a detailed substantive testing on transactions around the year end as sample basis to ensure revenues were recognized in the correct accounting period.
- We also tested journal entries focusing on sales transactions;
- Verified VAT return with General Ledger. We obtained supporting documents for sales, transactions recorded during the year as sample basis; and
- Finally assessed the appropriateness and presentation of disclosures against relevant accounting standards.

3. Inventories & Stores

See notes 3.07 and 9 to the financial statements

The key audit matter

The amount of Taka 5,855,123,047 has been reported as inventories & stores in the financial statements.

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realizable value. As a result, management has applied judgement in determining the appropriate values for inventories.

Considering the above factors and the risk associated with the determination of net realizable value of inventories, we have determined the same to be a key audit matter.

How the matter was addressed in our audit.

Our audit included the following procedures:

- Evaluating the design and implementation of key inventory controls operating across the factory and warehouse;
- Reconciling the inventories with opening inventories, purchase, production and sales during the period and with closing inventories;
- Testing, on a sample basis the stock expiry dates and the market price used in assessing the net realizable values of inventories of the related supporting documents.
- Comparing the net realizable value, obtained through a detailed review of sales subsequent to the year-end, to the cost price of a sample of inventories.

4. Long Term Loan with current portion & Short-Term Liabilities.

See notes 3.18 and 19, 24 and 26 to the financial statements

The key audit matter

At the end of financial year, the position of loans remained amounting to Taka 10,399,584,869 (Secured Loan, Secured Loan (Current Portion) and Short-Term Liabilities) for the Company.

Evidently, the Company is using loans to operate the business and also, to acquire non-current assets.

Therefore, it has been considered as a key audit area.

How the matter was addressed in our audit.

We obtained an understanding, evaluated the design, and tested the operational effectiveness of the Company's key controls over the loans. Our audit procedures included, among others, the following:

- Understanding and reviewing the nature and type of loans; and reviewing the board minutes for arrangements of the loans;
- Obtaining the repayment schedules, loan statements and facility offer letters to review terms, interest rates and other conditions associated with the loans;
- Reviewing the mortgages, major covenants, guarantees and interest rates etc. attached to the loans;
- Checking the adjustments or repayments of loans through bank statements per repayment schedules;
- Checking whether there is any overdue payments and penal interests; and Finally, assessing the appropriateness and presentation of disclosures against relevant accounting standards.

Trade and Other Receivables 5.

See notes 3.18 and 11 to the financial statements

The key audit matter

The Company has a trade and other receivables of Taka 6,945,500,527 as at 30 June 2025.

The Company is 100% export-oriented, which includes direct export through L/C and deemed export; therefore, related L/C, bank related documents and delivery challan are material issue, which requires proper correspondence with debtors.

How the matter was addressed in our audit.

Our substantive procedures in relation to the assessing trade and other receivables comprises the following:

- Obtained a list of outstanding receivables;
- Reconciliation of receivables ageing to general ledger;
- Conducting cut-off testing at the year-end;
- Confirmed with the client balance through related L/C, bank related documents and delivery challan.
- Reviewing subsequent receipt of receivables balance.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The annual report is expected to be made available to us after the date of this auditor's report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the annual report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards and other applicable laws and regulation and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.



Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities to express an opinion on the financial statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audit. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.



From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

In accordance with the Companies Act, 1994 and the Securities and Exchange Rules 2020, we also report the following:

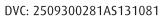

a. Background of the Company

Envoy Textiles Limited was incorporated as a private Company limited by shares registered under the Companies Act, 1994 vide registration no. C-28622 (2468)/1995 dated 18 June 1995 and converted into a public limited Company on 25 October 2009. The registered office of the Company is located at Envoy Tower, 18/E Lake Circus Kalabagan (West Panthapath), Dhaka-1205.

Envoy Textiles Limited had taken over the business, all assets and liabilities of Edge Denims Limited (incorporated as a private Company limited by shares registered under The Companies Act, 1994 vide registration no. C-28622 (2468)/1995 dated 18 June 1995) as per decision of the Extraordinary General Meetings of both the Companies held on 19 June 2009 with the consent of the Honorable Supreme Court of Bangladesh, High Court Division vide Company Matters no. 70 of 2009 and No. 71 of 2009 with effect from 30 September 2009 and Edge Denims Limited has no more in existence.

b. Activities of the Company

Envoy Textiles Limited is a manufacturer of 100% export-oriented denim fabrics with advanced quality denim fabric finishing and yarn manufacturing industry. It is the first rope denims plant in Bangladesh with highly sophisticated machineries of the USA, Europe and Japan. Commercial operation of the Company started from 01 March 2008.

3.00 Basis of Preparation:

3.01 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standards (IASs) and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs), the Companies Act 1994, Securities and Exchange Rules, 2020 and other applicable laws and regulations.

3.02 Regulatory Compliances

As required Envoy Textiles Limited comply with the following major legal provisions in addition to the Companies Act, 1994 and other applicable laws and regulations:

3.03 Measurement Bases used in preparing the Financial Statements

The elements of financial statements have been measured on "Historical Cost" basis, which is one of the most commonly adopted bases as provided in "the frame-work for the preparation and presentation of financial statements" issued by the International Accounting Standards Committee (IASC).

3.04 Components of the Financial Statements

According to the International Accounting Standards (IAS)-1 adopted by ICAB "Presentation of Financial Statements", the complete set of Financial Statements includes the following components.

- (i) Statement of Financial Position as at 30 June 2025.
- (ii) Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income for the year ended 30 June 2025.
- (iii) Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended 30 June 2025.
- (iv) Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended 30 June 2025.
- (v) Notes, comprising a Summary of Significant Accounting Policies for the year ended 30 June 2025.



3.05 Specific accounting policies selected and applied for significant transactions and events3.06 Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment comprises Factory Building, Rest House, Officer and Staff Quarter, Building Corporate Office, Factory Equipment, Furniture & Fixture, Machinery, ETP Cost, Office Equipment, Motor Vehicle, Software etc. Fixed assets are stated at their historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Land, building, other construction, machineries/equipments, ETP cost and office spaces measured and valued at fair value in compliance with International Accounting Standards (IASs)-16 "Property, Plant and Equipment".

Depreciation:

No depreciation has been charged on the Land and Land Development. Depreciation is charged on all other assets on reducing balance method. Depreciation has been charged on addition during the year when an asset becomes available for use. No depreciation is charged for land and capital work-in-progress. The rates of depreciation are as follows:

Intangible Asset:

Intangible asset that are acquired by the Company has finite useful lives are measured at cost less Accumulated Amortization and Accumulated impairment losses, if any subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates.

Intangible assets are amortized on a reducing balance method in profit or loss over their estimated useful lives of 5 years from the date that they are available for use. Amortization methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate. No internal developed intangible assets capitalized during the year.

Revaluation of Fixed Assets

The fixed assets as on 30 June 2010 have been revalued at fair market value as per decision of the board of directors. All fixed assets under land, building, machineries and equipment available on the cut-off date on 30 June 2010 were revalued by an independent valuation Company named Asian Surveyors Limited. The revaluation of assets has been made at present market value of land, building, machinery and equipment allowing due depreciation on building, machinery and equipment for the month which has already been expired from the estimate total useful life. The Company Again revalued land by Asian Surveyors Limited as at 30 June 2024. The Company has adjusted Tk. 272,547 relating to a prior period land revaluation, which increased both Land and Revaluation Surplus, in accordance with paragraph 49 of IAS 8.

Impairment of Assets

An asset is impaired when it carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The Company assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. The recoverable amount of an asset is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount by recognizing an impairment loss if, and only if, the recoverable amount of the asset is less than it carrying amount.

Impairment loss is recognized immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset shall be treated as a revaluation decrease. During the reporting year, no indication of impairment of any assets was found.

Subsequent Cost

Subsequent to initial recognition, cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably.

Disposal of Fixed Assets

An asset is recognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use and subsequent disposal. Gain or loss arising from the retirement or disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognized as gain or loss from disposal of asset under other income in the statements of comprehensive income. There was no disposal of asset during the period.

Capital Work in Progress

Capital work-in-progress represent the cost incurred for acquisition and/or construction of items of property, plant and equipment that were not ready for use at the end of year and these are stated at cost.

3.07 Inventories and Stores

Inventories and stores are comprising of raw materials, raw materials in transit, packaging materials, work in progress, finished goods, store items and spare & spare parts in transit. Inventories are valued at the lower of the cost and net realizable value.

3.08 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, bank current accounts, other bank deposits are free of encumbrance and having maturity date of three months or less from respective dates of deposit.

3.09 Statement of Cash Flows

Statement of Cash Flows is prepared in accordance with IAS- 7, and the cash flows from the operating activities have been presented under direct method as prescribed by the Securities and Exchange Rules, 2020 and considering the provision of paragraph 19 of IAS 7 which provides that "enterprises are encouraged to report cash flows from operating activities using the direct method".

3.10 Taxation

3.10.1 Tax Holiday

The Company enjoyed tax holiday for 4 (four) years commencing from 01 March 2008, under approval of National Board of Revenue (NBR) dated on September 09, 2008. The tax-holiday period of the Company expired on February 29, 2012 and due provision for Income Tax has been maintained in the statements of profit or loss and other comprehensive income. During the tax holiday period 40% of net profit of the Company is transferred to the tax holiday reserve in proportionately to invest in the areas as specified by the Income Tax Ordinance 1984. Income tax provision made after expiry of tax holiday period as per rate prevailing during that period.

3.10.2 Current Tax

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the period ended, using tax rates enacted or subsequently enacted after the reporting date and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years. Provision for taxation is calculated on the basis of applicable current tax rate and compliance with Finance Act, 2023.



3.10.3 Deferred Tax

Deferred tax arises due to temporary difference deductible or taxable for the transaction which is recognized in the statement of income statement. A temporary difference between the tax base of an asset or liability and it carrying amount/or amount in the Statement of Financial Position. Deferred tax assets or liability is the year income tax recoverable or payable in future periods recognized in the current period "IAS 12: Income Taxes.

3.11 Segment Reporting

Segment reporting is not applicable for the Company this year as the Company does not meet the criteria required for segment reporting specified in IFRS-8. "Operating Segment" A segment reporting is a distinguishable component of an entity that is engaged in providing products within a particular economic environment which is subject to risk and rewards that are different from those of other segments.

3.12 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized in accordance with IFRS 15 and the recognition process involves the following 5-step process:

- Identifying the contract from a customer;
- Identifying the performance obligation;
- Determining the transaction prices;
- Allocating the transaction price to the performance obligation; and
- Recognizing revenue when/as performance obligation(s) is satisfied.

In compliance with the requirements of IFRS 15, the Company recognizes revenue when control of the goods or services has been transferred to the customer and the performance obligation has been completed. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the amount of consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled to, including variable consideration, if any, to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal will not occur.

3.13 Other Income and Expenses

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis and all other income and expenses is recognized when it is received.

3.14 Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions in Foreign Currencies are translated into BDT at the rate of exchange ruling on date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies are translated into BDT at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Gains or losses resulting from foreign currency transactions are taken to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

3.15 Borrowing Costs/Financial Expenses

Borrowing costs are recognized as expenses in the period in which they incurred and capitalized the same that incurred before commencement of commercial operation.

3.16 Earnings Per Share (EPS)

The Company presents basic and diluted (when dilution is applicable) earnings per share (EPS) for its ordinary shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company with the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the period, adjusted for the effect of change in number of shares for bonus issue.

Diluted EPS is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding, for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares. However, dilution of EPS is not applicable for these financial statements as there was no dilutive potential ordinary shares during the relevant year

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3.17 Workers Profit Participation Fund (WPPF)

The Company has recognized with the Labor Law 2006, amendment in 2013 and 2018 and introduced workers profit participation fund (5% of profit before charging such expenses).

3.18 Financial Instruments:

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized on the balance sheet when the Company has become a party to a contractual provision of the instrument:

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables are stated at their nominal value and considered goods. No provision has been made for doubtful debt and no amount was written off as bad.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables are stated at their nominal value as of the reporting date.

Due to/Due from Related Parties

Due to /due from related parties are stated at nominal value.

Borrowings/Secured Loan

Interest bearing bank loans and overdrafts are recorded at the proceeds received. Finance charges are accounted for on an accrual basis.

Financial Risk Management:

The Company has exposures to the following risks its use of financial statements:

- Credit risk
- Liquidity risk
- Market risk

The Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. The Board oversees how management monitors compliance with risk management policies and procedures, and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to risks faced by the Company. The Board is assisted in its oversight role by Audit Committee. Internal audit, under the purview of Audit Committee, undertakes both regular and adhoc reviews of risk management controls and procedures, the results of which are reported to the Audit Committee.

Credit Risk:

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a buyer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivable from customers. Sales made to the entity are fully secured by Letters of Credit issued by local scheduled banks.

Liquidity Risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will unable to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Company's reputation. In general, management ensures that it has sufficient cash and cash equivalent to meet expected operational expenses, including the servicing of financial obligation through preparation of the cash forecast, prepared based on time line of payment of the financial obligation and accordingly arrange for sufficient liquidity/fund to make the expected payment within due date.

Moreover, the Company seeks to maintain short term lines of credit with scheduled commercial banks to ensure payment of obligations in the event that there is insufficient cash to make the required payment.



The requirement is determined in advance through cash flows projections and credit lines facilities with banks are negotiated accordingly.

Seeks to maintain a balance between the higher returns that might be possible with higher levels of borrowings and the advantages and security afforded by a sound capital position. The Board also monitors dividend trend to ordinary shareholders.

Market Risk:

Market Risk is the risk that changes in market prices such as foreign exchange rates and interest rates will affect the Company's income or the value of its holding of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimizing the return.

Capital Risk Management

The Company's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Company's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain an optimal capital structure to reduce the cost of capital. The Board seeks to maintain a balance between the higher returns that might be possible with higher levels of borrowings and the advantages and security afforded by a sound capital position. The Board also monitors dividend trend to ordinary shareholders.

Money Laundering

The Company considers prevention of money laundering risk not only as a compliance requirement imposed by the law of the country but also as one of its ethical business values.

3.19 Contingencies

Contingent Liabilities

Contingent liabilities are a possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity.

Contingent liabilities should not be recognized in the financial statements, but may require disclosure. A provision should be recognized in the year in which the recognition criteria provision has been met.

Contingent Assets

Contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity.

A contingent asset must not be recognized. Only when the realization of the related economic benefits is virtually certain should recognition take place provided that it can be measured reliably because, at that point, the asset is no longer contingent.

3.20 IFRS 16: Leases

General impact of application of IFRS 16 Leases

IFRS 16 introduces requirements with respect to lease accounting. It introduces significant changes to the lessee accounting by removing the distinction between operating and finance leases and requiring the recognition of a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low value assets. In contrast to lessee accounting, the requirements for lessor accounting have remained largely unchanged. Details of these requirements are described in notes to the financial statement. The impact of the adoption of IFRS 16 on the Company's financial statements is described below.

The Company has applied IFRS 16 using the modified retrospective approach, without restatement of the comparative information.

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The Company assessed the impact of IFRS 16 and one rental office space for 6 years is considered as Right-of-Use assets and lease liability at reporting date.

3.21 Event After the Reporting Period

In compliance with the requirements of "IAS-10: Event After the Reporting Period" that provide additional information about the Company's position at the date of the financial position are reflected in the financial statements and events after the reporting period that are not adjusting events are disclosed by way of note.

3.22 Date of Authorization:

The audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 were authorized by the Board of Directors at 25 September 2025 for publication.

4.00 Additional Information

4.01 Responsibility for preparation and presentation of Financial Statements

The Board of Directors are responsible for the preparation and presentation of Financial Statements under Section 183 of the Companies Act, 1994 and as per the provision of "the framework for the preparation and presentation of financial statements" issued by the International Accounting Standards Committee (IASC).

4.02 Risk and uncertainties for use of estimates in preparation of financial statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the International Accounting Standards requires management to make estimates and assumption that affect the report, amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and revenue and expenses during the period reported. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates are used for accounting of certain terms such as long-term contracts, provision for doubtful accounts, depreciation and amortization, employees benefit plans, taxes reserves and contingencies.

4.03 Reporting currency and level of precision

The figures in the financial statements represent Bangladesh currency (Taka), which have been rounded off to the nearest integer.

4.04 Going Concern

The Company has adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. For this reason, the directors continue to adopt going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

4.05 Period of Financial Statements

Period of financial statements is from 01 July 2024 to 30 June 2025

4.06 Significant Events

Net profit margin after tax and EPS of the company increased by 134.66% respectively as compared to the previous year. Revenue increased by 30.60% over the previous financial year due to increase in demand for denim fabrics in the international market. Cost of goods sold also decreased by 2.73% on sales due to improvement of efficiency in production and efficiency on different cost components, increase of average sales rate and increase USD exchange rate in compound to previous year.

Net operating cash flow stood at taka 4.77 per share from taka 3.68 in the previous year due to increase in net profit after TAX and increase in accounts payable, NAV increased from 51.93 to 58.32 due to increases in net profit compared to previous year.

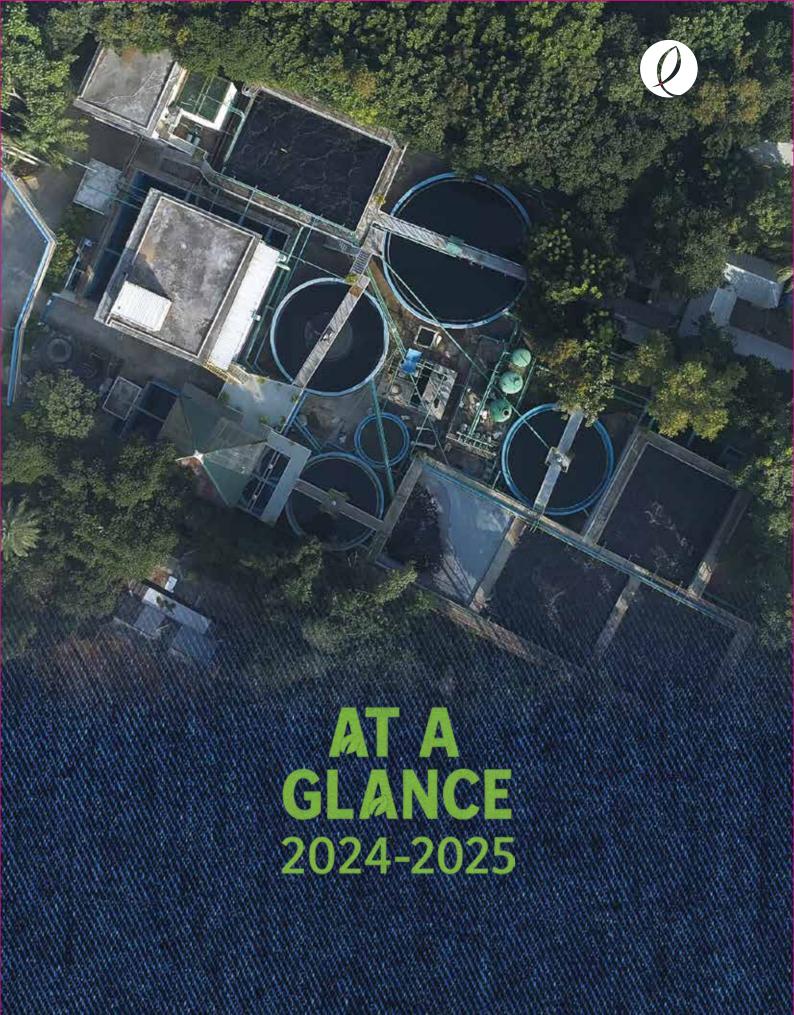
